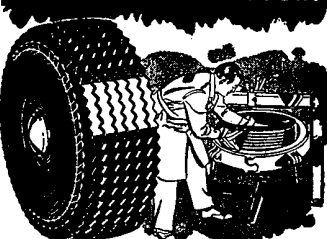

LEGAL NOTICES

COMMISSIONER'S PROCEEDINGS

Special Meeting called this 24th day of January A.D. 1945, and called to order by the clerk, for the purpose of amending Sections 3, 4, and 5 of Chapter XVI of the Charter of the City of Farmington.

It was moved (seconded) and supported (seconded) that the following be adopted:

Resolved, that we amend Section 3 of Chapter XVI of the Charter under the heading Powers and Duties of Commission to read as follows:

The Commission may, by resolution, declare that certain real estate, including, covenants and shade trees adjacent to any property abutting upon a public street, shall be built or rebuilt, constructed, planted or removed, upon the issuance of such resolution, the City Commission shall cause written notice of the passage thereof to be given to the owner of each parcel of land abutting upon such street, who may be a resident of the City, in the manner provided by law for the service of summons in civil actions. A copy of the notice, with the time and manner of service evidenced thereon, signed by the person serving it, shall be returned to the City Clerk, who shall file and preserve such returns. For the purpose of such service, if the owner of such property be not a resident of the City, such notice shall be served by the collection of rent or the payment of taxes on the property, or by direct contact with him in any way, shall be regarded as the receipt of such notice, and service upon any such person shall have the like force and effect as though personal service were made upon the owner thereof. If it appears in any such return, however, that the owner is a non-resident, or that neither said owner or agent could be found, one publication of the notice in a general circulation in the City shall constitute sufficient notice to the owner. If, upon such publication, curbing or gutters be not constructed or such trees planted or not constructed within fifteen days of the service of the notice provided for in the preceding section, or the completion of the publication thereof, the Commission may proceed by direct employment of labor or by contract, to carry out the said construction at the expense of the owner, and all such expense shall be reported to the Commission. The Commission shall thereupon, by ordinance, assess the cost and expense thereof upon the owner or owners of all the property bounded or abutting thereon or benefited thereby, and such assessment shall be collected in the same manner as other assessments with a penalty of five per cent interest for failure to pay at the time fixed by the assessment resolution.

Use it further provided that Section 4 of Chapter XVI of the Charter be amended to read as follows:

The Commission may at any time borrow money, and authorize the passage and payment of bonds therefor, in anticipation of the collection of assessments levied for the purpose of paying the cost of constructing sidewalks, curbing and gutters, or other improvements, and may, if authorized by the Commission upon the failure of the owners of the property to be benefited thereby, to cause such improvements to be constructed, and the cost thereof to be assessed against the owners of the property so benefited.

And be it further resolved that the amendments so proposed be submitted to the voters of the City of Farmington at the next regular election to be held on the 2nd day of April in the year 1945.

1945 GOALS ARE IMPORTANT FOR FARM PLANS

Farmers can well give serious thought to three important factors in laying their plans for 1945; he leaves County Agricultural Agent Karl D. Bailey.

The war has not yet been won. Tough fighting is ahead, involving great armies of men and material. Farmers must continue producing at about the same level as they did in 1944 to assure essential quantities of food.

2. Recommended goals must be met to give utmost aid to the war effort. Material increases are needed in some crops. Four of these—all major food products in which shortages exist—are raised in this state. They are sugarbeets, dry beans, potatoes, and milk. Supplies of several other crops must be rebuilt, but production beyond the suggested goals is not necessary.

3. Demand for farm products can change rapidly in war time, or in the period of transition to peace. If changing conditions call for adjustments in goals before planting time, the War Food Administration will so advise farmers. But until conditions warrant any change, present programs, farm plan goals should be held to the recommended goals in 1945.
