FALCONS TAKE SECOND VICTORY FROM NORTHVILLE

Throwing every ounce of their skill and strength into the conflict, the Farmington Falcons for the second time this season overran the Northville cagers. In their first encounter with Northville the Falcons completely overpowered them with a lead of 31 points, but it was a much more experienced and qualified team which came on the floor to face the Falcons last Friday. They played a good, hard, fast game.

In the first quarter of the varsity game, which started at 9 o'clock, an improvement in the quality of the playing of both Northville and Farmington teams was evident. The Falcons, who have tried so hard this season to develop split-second passing and shooting plays, completed quite a few, coming out on top with a score of 9-6.

In the next quarter Coach Hutson maintained a flow of substitutes onto the floor, and the playing became very hot as both teams raced from one end of the gym to the other. Basket after basket was made, and the scores bounced ahead by leaps and bounds. As the buzzer sounded at the half, a tally of the scores proved Northville in the lead by one basket, 20-18.

As a means to soothe the throats between the halves the Glee Club repeated the skit on "The Trolley Song" that he presented at a pep meeting the week before. The sparkling comedy and melodic refrains were a welcome release from the tension of the game.

In the beginning of the second half the Falcons, answered because the initiative had been taken from them, fought with vengeance in their hearts, matching their opponent blow for blow. Thus using their speedy passing and shooting they were able to regain their lead by the end of the third quarter, 31-25.

In the last quarter the Falcons had definitely been dealt the upper hand. Their lead was ever increasing, though the Northville team was fighting hard. Again this season the Falcons had proved their might over the Northville cagers.

This Friday the Falcons traveled to Birmingham to assert their rights as victors for the second time this season over the lads from Baldwin High. —T.R.



Upon the Sturgeon River in Baraga County, Mr. Q. Y. Bell was hunting deer. When he came up on this tree, he noticed the thickness of it and the tooth-work of nearby beavers.

The trunk of the tree (which you still can see if you glance at the display) was almost entirely chewed through by the beavers. The tooth-marks show how very strong and sharp their teeth are. On the wood is carved these words: Beaver Slump—Sturgeon River, Baraga Co. C. V. Bell.
