Miss Bourke-White is not return-ing from Europe until the late Spring. At the present time she is takking pictures as an accredited photographer with the 8th Army. Miss Lee, a noted Chinese filer and patriot, has a number of 'lirsts' to her credit. She was the first and only woman to gradu-ate from the Boering School of Aeronautics in California, where she took advanced training.
