

# **EDITORIALS**

#### The Step Forward

This is a day of many changes. It is a period in which we must all look ahead to a fast-approaching future when we must find ourselves ready to meet the demands of a progressive, growing community. This is particularly true of our governing and planning units.

The people of this community have expressed their desire for a modern, up-to-date school system, through their vote in favor of consolidation. This action has brought together the various schools of the City and Township, and we now find them operating as one large district. There is every indication that this district will see remarkable growth. It is growing steadily now, but there will be a sharp increase just as soon as building materials are again available.

We previously indicated our interest in seeing the consolidation approved, and we still maintain that viewpoint. A consolidated district has many advantages to offer the school child. Many fields are thus opened to him, which otherwise would not be avail-

Such a system also makes demands. It calls for a well qualified board, whose members are willing to put aside personal feelings and prejudices for the good of the students. It may be necessary to make considerable adjustment to meet the new requirements of the larger district, for no longer is it possible to apply methods adequate to serve a small unit, and hope they will meet with the same degree of success in a much larger system.

A school can be no better than its teaching staff and this staff operates under the direction of the superintendent and his assistants. If that superintendent is to successfully direct his teachers, and prepare a curriculum that will be of the greatest benefit to all students, he must be free to initiate new steps in the system, with the assurance that the board will give their support.

The board members, in turn, should recognize professional principal that the superintendent and his staff initiate recommendations. The administration of school affairs lies with them, and surely they will not propose measures which are neither practical nor

Farmington can have one of the finest school systems for communities of this size but what is done now will be the determining factor. Let's get our heads together, and have a school system that will give our boys and girls the best possible program of preparedness for their place in this world.

Stroke Fatal to Fred Goers

Fred J. Goers, 83, one of Parmington's oldest and best known residents, died of a stroke Wednesday afternoon at his home, 23816 Farnington Road. Mr. Goers was born in Mecklenburg, Germany, on January 16, 1852. He came to Michigan in 1863 and established a residence in Parmington Township where he lived for 10 years.
