#### Keep The Future Bright

In view of the greatly changed National picture, In view of the greatly changed National picture, is expected that there will be a flood of radio and newspaper comment, designed to affect the thinking of the American people. Already have come reports of vicious and vitriolic attack upon political happy fellowship. liberty and individual enterprise.

You may have heard a recent program which de-picted a returning soldier driving along in his old car, and then stopping to ask which of two roads he should take to reach the "Postwar World." One of the roads ahead is that of individual enterprise and is marked by 'unemployment, idleness, disease, ignorance, squalor . . . broken down shacks, children running barefoot along grimy streets." Then came various little skits showing all this, and finally the Narrator asks "Have you seen enough, Joe, or do you want to go on?"

Needless to say, Joe had seen enough, and wanted to know about the other road. This other road. according to the "Narrator," was the road to full employment, and was based on William Beveridge's Morning Worship, 11:00 a.m. book, "Full Employment in a Free Society." In brief, it advocated the government assuming direct responit advocated the government assuming direct responsibility for the citizens' economic welfare, by setting ap a planned economy—an economic wenare, by setting up a planned economy—an economy directed by the government which would coordinate manpower, industry, money, and materials. Spending for consumption would be kept at a steady high level, and solve the government would have the power and the only the government would have the power and the means to do so. The program ended with questions and answers of the "opposition," every question carefully designed to put the questioner in the worst possible light.

This was a distorted and inaccurate picture of the record and possibilities of the individual-enter prise system, pleading for the destruction of Ameri-

prise system, pleading for the destruction of America's traditional form of government.

Against this picture, let's weigh the future as planned by our boys who are out there fighting the battle. Remember that letter that said, "Until I actually saw it, I never could have believed what complete regimentation can do to a people. It was done so cleverly and so gradually by their leaders. The people traded rights as free citizens for glittering promises of security. Within a few years they had not only lost their freedoms but their security, Rev. Orville J. Windell. Pastor two."
