Motion made by Bagnall and supported by Hinger that the Com-
mission of the City of Farmington sponsor some young man qualified
to attend a meeting of the Wolverine Boys State, Inc. to be held in East
Lansing June 14th to June 22nd. The expense of \$20.00 to be paid by
the City of Farmington. Roll Call: Nacker, Bagnall, Hinger, Hatton,
Conroy and Jones.

Minutes of the regular meeting held April 5th, 1945 were read
and approved.

Mayor Hamill appointed the following Committees: Streets and
Sidewalks, Hatton; Sewers, Parks, Boulevards, Hinger; Finance and
Ordinance, Bagnall; Water, Conroy; Public Buildings and Cemetery,
Jones; Police and Fire Depts., Nacker.

Motion made by Hinger and supported by Conroy that the Com-
mittees be confirmed. Roll Call: Hatton, Hinger, Bagnall, Conroy,
Jones and Nacker.

Motion made by Bagnall and supported by Jones that the Veterans
of Foreign Wars be allowed the use of the Farmington Town Hall for
organization meetings only for the next six months free of charge.
Carried, all yeas.

Mayor Hamill appointed Commissioners Conroy, Bagnall, Hatton
to work out some plan to take care of the problem of garbage collection
and disposal.

Motion made by Nacker and supported by Hinger that Commissioner
Bagnall be named Mayor Pro-Tem. Carried, all yeas.

Motion made by Bagnall and supported by Hinger that Arthur G.
Lamb be appointed Supervisor for two years. Carried, all yeas.

Motion made by Hatton and supported by Nacker that Dr. Aschen-
brenner be appointed Health Officer for the next two years. Carried,
all yeas.

Motion made by Nacker and supported by Conroy that Monday
and Tuesday, May 7th and 8th be named "Clean Up days" in the City
of Farmington. Carried, all yeas.

Motion made by Bagnall and supported by Hatton that the current
tax bills due July 1, 1945, to the City of Farmington be received up to
September 1, 1945 without penalty. A two-per-cent penalty will be
charged beginning November 1, 1945. After March 1, 1946 all delin-
quent taxes will be returned to the Oakland County Treasurer. It is
also moved that the City Treasurer be authorized to send a notice to
all tax payers who are delinquent August 15th, 1945. Carried, all yeas.

Motion made by Hinger and supported by Nacker that meeting be
adjourned. Carried, all yeas.
