The performance of these hazardous and exhaustive duties was done in a manner which reflects favorably on the high degree of training and combat efficiency of the division as a whole and evidences an esprit de corps characteristic of the finest traditions of the United States Army."

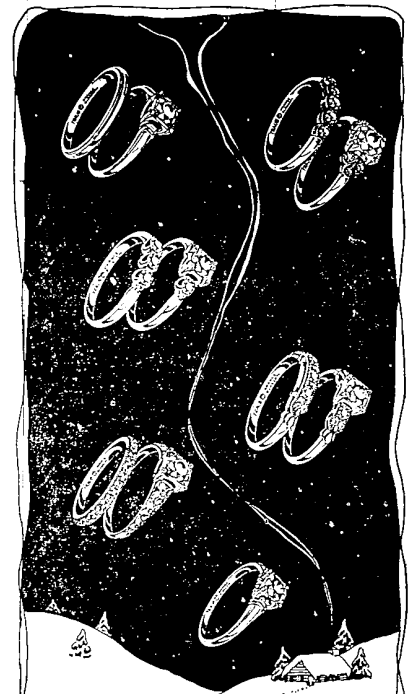


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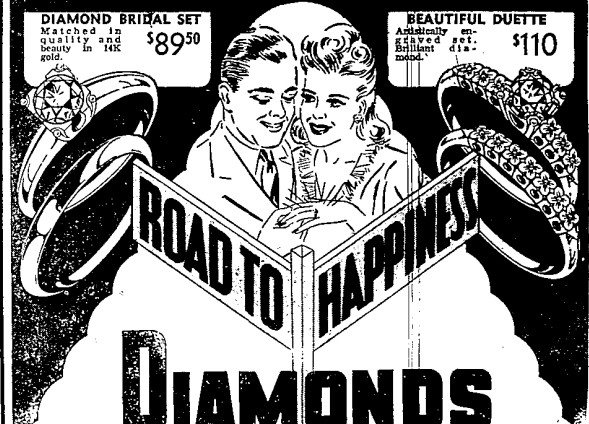


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
