## The Chocolate's In The Center Of This Delicious Syrup Cake



New cake recipe concentrates good chocolate flavor in the creamy filling. Serve with freshly made coffee.

Two tender white layers are put together with a rich, dark filling in Chocolate Cream Cake. A thin confectioner's sugar icing and shaved sweet chocolate top this new dessert. Bottled light syrup adds smooth consistency to the batter.

Chocolate Cream Cake and a cup of hot, steaming coffee, made fresh from a vacuum-packed jar, are an unobtainable dessert combination.

**Chocolate Cream Cake**  
(Two 8-inch layers)  
1 1/2 cups cake flour  
2 teaspoons baking powder  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/2 cup shortening  
1/2 cup sugar  
1 cup bottled syrup (light)  
2 eggs, well beaten  
1/2 cup bottled milk  
1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract  
1/4 teaspoon almond extract

Sift flour, measure and sift with baking powder and salt. Cream shortening. Add sugar gradually. Blend in syrup slowly, beating after each addition. Add well-

beaten eggs in four portions, blending well. Add milk and extracts alternately with dry ingredients, beating well after each addition. Pour in two well-greased layer pans. Bake in moderately hot oven (375 deg. F.) 25-30 minutes. Turn out on a rack and cool. Put together with Chocolate Cream Filling and top with thin confectioner's sugar icing. Grated sweet chocolate, chocolate shot, or chocolate buds may be sprinkled on icing.

**Chocolate Cream Filling:** Combine 1/2 cup sugar, 3 tablespoons flour and 1/4 teaspoon salt in top of double boiler over boiling water. Add 1 1/2 cups bottled milk gradually, mixing until smooth. Add 2 squares (ounces) grated unsweetened chocolate after cooking, stirring constantly, until mixture thickens. Cover and cook for 10 minutes, stirring occasionally.

Add a bit of hot mixture to a beaten egg, then add egg to mixture. Cook 2 minutes longer, stirring constantly. Add 2 tablespoonsable fat and stir until melted. Remove from heat. Cool, add 1/4 teaspoon vanilla extract and chill.

Susan of the Green Mountains — Genevieve Fox. It took the Eldredge family many days to make the journey from their old home in Connecticut to their new home in what is now Vermont. Towards the end of the journey they could not even keep the wagon for there was no road. This was in 1773. Although there was no thought as yet of the Revolution, Vermont was not peaceful. The governors of both New Hampshire and New York claimed the right to divide it among their settlers. Ethan Allen had organized his Green Mountain Boys to prevent New York men from taking from settlers the land they had already cleared and the homes they had built. Susan was destined to see Ethan Allen more

than once. Once he came to her rescue when the "Yorks" raided the Eldredge homestead. Susan returned the favor when she foiled the spy who would have betrayed Ethan Allen and the Green Mountain Boys to the commander at Fort Ticonderoga.

This is a story of exciting pioneer days and of a quick-witted, brave pioneer girl.

**Smoky Ridge** — Fredric Doyle. In beautiful language, and without sentimentality, Fredric Doyle takes us into the world of animals and birds of Smoky Ridge. Life is a short cycle of birth, wandering from the burrow, mating and death. For even as in the world of men, there is not always enough of the good things of Smoky Ridge to go around, after the days of fire and flood, winter storms and summer drought, and the cry of battle comes often. We look with new interest and insight into the animals' wanderings and struggles to survive. There is Tawny, the beaver, leading her brood to a new home where the water is clean; Princess of Pine Creek flaunting her proud hawk spirit once too often; Stripes, the skunk, carrying his wounded brother to safety; White Throat, the mink; the chase of the fox and many others. Fredric Doyle, with an intimate knowledge of wild life, great and small, and remarkable sensitivity to the rhythm of this life — its age-old tragedies, beauties and inevitabilities — does not fall into the error of making them people. The writing itself is unusual — dramatic, at times almost poetic — and succeeds in bringing the reader very close to the primitive world.

**Sabina** — Elizabeth Howard. When Sabina set out for Detroit aboard the Forest Queen a hundred years ago, she had no idea what lay ahead of her among her unknown relatives. She was not even sure if she would be welcome at the end of her journey. How she fitted herself into the surroundings that were waiting for her, and how she had faith in the bound-boy, Joel, even when his future seemed darkest, form the thread of the story. And always Sabina and her cousin, Letty, found their thoughts very full of bonnets, crinolines, and taffeta, of romance and parties, to say nothing of a wedding.

The fine characterizations and the fresh focus on pioneer life emphasizing the romance and entertainment as well as the discipline and hardships will win for Sabina an important place among the historical romances for girls from twelve to sixteen.

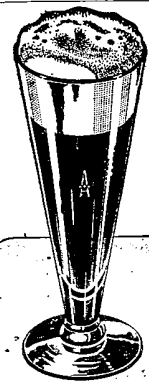

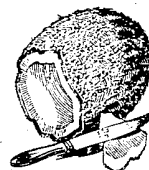
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
