



been undermined by a few newspaper articles. What the report in question states is true only under one set of extremely improbable (and generally impossible) circumstances. Subject A drinks, let's say, a quart a day.

drinks, let's say, a quart a day, Sabject B uses pure, sterile heroin, injected with absolutely sterile syringes and needles. The amount of heroin is precisely measured and gauged to the tolerance of the user. The shots are given by someone thoroughly trained in injection techniques. Then the drinker may be at greater peril than the user of heroin. (This points out the considerable dangers of alcohol.) But!

siderable dangers of alcohol.) But!
But pure, sterile heroin is not available. No way. The average heroin addict uses injection equipment that is not merely unsterile but is generally grossly contaminated. The amount of heroin in a "abg", is always an unknown quantity to the user. Poor injection techniques are usually the rule rather than the exception.
The result? Medical journals today are full of articles documenting profound damage in heroin users to the eye, the brain, the heart and other muscles, the lungs, the liver-to virtually every tissue system and organ. Sometimes heroin is the cause; sometimes inherit and some contaminants; sometimes or contaminants; sometimes or contaminants; sometimes or contaminants;

metimes other drugs used to

sometimes other drugs used to dilut: the heroin.

It would be no exaggeration to say that heroin addicts are literally dropping like files from overdoses. Hepatitis becomes a threat not merely to health but to life. Contamination and poor techniques all too often injection that can result with nijection that can result with in jection that can result with in all too many cases - in life-threatening systemic in. threatening systemic

threatening systemic infections.

More could be said, but at risk of belaboring the point. The point is simply that heroin addiction is fantastically more dangerous than alcohol - if you look at it in the setting in which it occurs: the street, and not in an ivory tower.
