Young Citizens Given Tomorrow's Challenge

The "Challenge to Tomorrow" for the state is to realize the true greatness Michigan can have.

A way to accept this challenge is to save the present system from doing things better, says Barry Brown, director of the Michigan Department of Labor.

Doing things better was the theme of Brown's speech Feb. 24 to the Farmington Soroptimists for its youth citizenship award program in Building J of the Orchard Ridge campus of Oakland Community College.

Following the keynote address, the Soroptimists presented citizenship grant awards to James Abowd, Ted Smith and Charles Cook.

It was Brown's first appearance in Farmington, and his second will be March 9 when he will be guest speaker for the annual "eye-opener" breakfast sponsored by the Farmington Chamber of Commerce at 8 a.m. in Bedford Inn.

MICHIGAN does not have to face depleting resources and declining population for some time, Brown said, and the growth approach now should be to continue what has been done, only better.

Among the growth approaches mentioned were: boost tourism in the spring and fall seasons; utilize more fully the growing labor market of women; seek to attract the regional offices and sales divisions to stabilize the economy by having less heavy industry; improve transportation; and establish a "common market" between Michigan and Ontario.

"We must find persons who really want to work and equip them to work to turn them into tax contributors," said Brown. These persons would include youth, women, the aged and handicapped.

Registration Dates Told

Special voter registration hours have been established by Farmington Township for the Farmington School District millage election on April 24, announces Clerk Floyd Cairns.

The district is asking for 3.5 mills (\$3.50 per \$1,000 state equalized valuation) for one year for operational expenses.

Voters may register for that election on Saturday, March 11 and 18, from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. in the township hall or on Monday and Tuesday, March 13, 14, from 8:30 a.m. to 8 p.m.

The last date to register for the school election is Friday, March 24, from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Voters may register any weekday from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. at the clerk's office.
