### A Share In Victory

"Lucky Seventh", the current War Loan has been termed, and for those who believe in luck the phrase has an appeal. But we prefer to bank on certainty, and certain it is that by oversubscribing the loan, Americans will be providing means to hasten complete Victory.

In a statement on V-E Day General Eisenhower said that the victory in Europe belonged to every citizen of the United Nations "who has done his or her duty whether in uniform or in civilian life." In the United States, the purchase of war bonds constituted an important part of that duty, and those who had purchased without stint felt particularly reward ed. Now opportunity is offered to obtain a specific share in the Pacific victory.

No one can know as well as the lads who do the fighting, the vital necessity of sufficient, first-grade military equipment, such as has been furnished through war loan funds. When we have examples before us of men returned from the battle zones, or now home after liberation from prison camps, who are putting all their money into war bonds, we cannot do otherwise than follow the course they have set.

How can we do less than subscribe every available dollar to meet the goal of the Seventh War Loan?




