The author has extraordinary knowledge from first-hand experience with racoons and other animals. It is seldom that one finds combined in one story such accurate pictures of animals and such real sympathy and penetration into the mind of a young colored boy.

When he sees a circus dog with ears painted blue, Timothy wants blue ears, and he persists until he learns that brown ears are the best for him. Little Timothy wants so many things—but time takes care of most of them, and at the end of the story he is happy to be just himself, Peter's dog.
