Your City and Township Salvage Committee could not help but answer your editorial of the 29th of June with a few comments which should lead to a better understanding of Salvage Collection.

For facts, housewives receive cash plus red points, thus assuring good collections.

For rats and papers, the public is paid a cash rate per pound higher than most communities, due to the fact that the local Salvage Committee is not in a salvage profit business but gives to the public the same rates per pound as they receive from the paper dealer.

The Farmington Lumber & Coal Company DONATES their weighing facilities, their time and efforts for weighing and paying, plus providing a barn, free of charge, for housing local salvage materials. Results are that paper collections are fairly good.

Tin Cans? That's a different matter. The costs to the government of "detaining" tin cans are so high that the price paid to communities is so low that they cannot be paid to individuals for flattened tin cans. The "detaining" plants will not accept less than "carload" lots of tin cans, which forces the local Salvage Committee to make arrangements with the County Salvage Committee for the saving of tin cans at the Salvage Collection Center.

The cost of these "pick-ups" runs as high as the price of tin cans are sold for, therefore we cannot offer, as a Salvage Committee, any monetary or other inducement for the saving of tin cans. In addition, the kitchen help seems to object to taking "time out" to wash and flatten and save the tin cans for war purposes. Some tin can collections in the City of Farmington have been so small, it was hardly worth the effort put forth by the City trucks to collect them. The Salvage Committee stands ready at all times to handle all types of salvage, but they cannot do it alone. The citizens of Farmington have their duty to perform as well as various official defense committees and without the whole hearted support of everyone nothing of a co-operative nature can be accomplished. Residents of the Township have saved, and DELIVERED to the Salvage Collection Center, two-fifths more tin cans than the City of Farmington. We hope that on Tuesday, July 10th, our local citizenry will show their patriotism by having an extra amount of tin cans at the curb for collection.
