DO NOT HAVE
TONSILS REMOVED
UNTIL LATER

Do not have your children's
tonsils and adenoids removed un-
til the polio season is over. In the
advice given by Dr. William De-
Kleins, state commissioner of
health.

"Careful study has shown that
such operations, when done dur-
ing an epidemic, tend to increase
the danger of contracting infantile
paralysis in its most serious
form," the commissioner said.

Doctor DeKleins says this ad-
vice is based on statements issued
by the American Medical Associa-
tion and the National Foundation
for Infantile Paralysis, and by
leading laryngologists (throat spe-
cialists).

Through July 12 this year there
were only 15 cases of polio re-
ported in Michigan, exactly the
same number that occurred for
that period last year. The up-
swing in cases usually begins
around the middle of July in Mi-
chigan, Doctor DeKleins said, and
the polio season ends in late Sep-
tember or early October.

Do not assume that a stomach
upset with vomiting, constipation,
diarrhea, severe headache or
signs of a cold and fever are of
no importance. These may be among
the first symptoms of infantile
paralysis. All persons sick with
unexplained fever should be put
to bed and isolated. Call a phys-
ician promptly. Proper care from
the onset of the disease may mean
the difference between crippling
and good recovery.

Other simple precautions for
the polio season include:

Avoid overeating and extreme
fatigue from strenuous exercise.

Avoid sudden chilling such as
would come from a plunge into
extremely cold water on a very
hot day.

Pay careful attention to person-
al cleanliness, such as thorough
hand washing before eating.

Do not swim in polluted water.

Maintain community sanitation
at a high level at all times.

Avoid all unnecessary contact
with persons with any illness sus-
picious of infantile paralysis.
