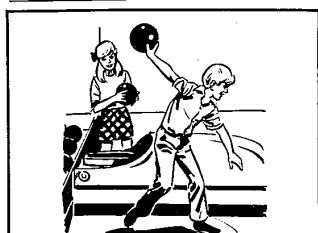
DROP-IN CENTER
