

Avoid Streaks in Dyeing
Satisfactory results can be obtained in redyeing discarded pieces of clothing to extend their usefulness. After dissolving the dye in about one cup of warm water, strain it through a thin muslin cloth before adding it to the dye bath. This eliminates the undissolved particles of dye which are apt to cause streaks in the material.

Removing Spots
When cleaning a garment at home pump up the spot well with a pad of uncescotoh or white blotting paper. Work with the spotted side next to the pad so that the liquid will carry the stain out, not through the material. The padding will absorb the fluid carrying the spot.

Snowball is the name of an Army transport operation which has been running to Europe since July 1944. During the winter and spring, the outfit brought back over 7,000 Litter patients from Orly Field, Paris. Currently the fleet is carrying ex-combat boys home for redeployment. Snowball also operates an air line service from Presque Isle, Maine, to Stockholm, Sweden on regularly scheduled flights.

Gordon Fuller of Deering is home from E.T.W., carrying a number of Battle Stars.

Lt. Wm. Pink has been awarded the Air Medal, according to official notification received by his parents from his superior, General Kenney.

Tom MacArthur has attained the rank of Ensign in the Merchant Marines, following additional schooling in the East, after returning from lengthy service in E.T.W.

Forty-six survivors of a Navy medium landing ship have reported at Treasure Island, en route home on 30 days leave after many months at sea.

The men were rescued after the sinking of their craft, an LSM, in action near Okinawa, victim of a Jap suicide plane. The Kamikaze crash ignited drums of high-octane fuel, the highly trained crew quickly got the flames under control. The ship sank in eleven minutes, however, due to other damage.

The LSM participated in the two Jima campaigns, completing assault landings under heavy gunfire. A near miss from mortar shelling put her starboard engine out of action. Later the vessel was rammed by a floating pontoon barge, took eight feet of water in her engine room and was derailed without lights and heat for nine days.

Only two crew members were lost with the craft at Okinawa. James Harold Childress, radio man third class, of 2924 Breton Drive, Farmington, was a survivor of the LSM who reported at Treasure Island.

S/Sgt. T. J. Bacon is home on furlough. After completion of his furlough he will report to California and be reassigned from there.

S/Sgt. Stuart D. Ruelle has returned to Lyndall Field, Panama City, Florida, after spending a seventeen day furlough with his family.

S/Sgt. Henry L. Chaver, son of Margaret Chaver, 26319 Mayfield, Farmington, member of the 36th 3rd Bn 141st of the veteran 36th "Texas" Division, has been awarded the Bronze Arrowhead to wear on his European Theater of Oper-

ations ribbon. The Arrowhead has been awarded for participation on the "Riviera invasion when he made the D-Day amphibious assault.

The 36th Infantry Division has been action on two D-Days: Italy and Southern France.

Pasture Improvement
Pasture, which could be one of the most profitable of farm crops, gets the least attention of any of them, in the opinion of extension agronomists. They suggest a pasture improvement program that provides livestock with one type of sod for the majority of the pasture season and another type of sod for midsummer pasture. The start toward both types is the same, an application of lime heavy enough to permit successful production of legumes. The quickest way to establish the midsummer pasture is to disc the old pasture sod until it is loosened and dead, and this usually requires two discings, with the disc lapped half way each time. When a good pasture is established it should be maintained by protecting it from overgrazing.

Steamboat Pioneer
The development of power in ships owes much to the pioneering work of Robert Fulton. In America, the expansion of steamboats exceeded that of Europe, largely due to his genius. Fulton, above all, was an engineer. He knew how to benefit by trial and error more than any one else in the field of marine transportation at that time. After his first American steamboat, Fulton rejected steam engines made in Europe. He designed his own engines, made them more efficient than those of European design. They were lighter, more powerful, more economical, more dependable.

Bedtime Bath
The bedtime bath should be soothing, so make it moderate in temperature, followed by a moderate rinse. Children or grownups who cannot go to sleep often find a soothing bath just the thing to quiet nerves and produce sleep. Wise mothers often give tepid baths to fussy children and find that these baths quiet young nerves perfectly before daytime nap periods.

PROGRAM EXPANDED FOR VETERANS

Intended especially for veterans the University of Detroit evening college program on the McNichols campus has been expanded so that day time students may secure regular college training in the arts and sciences, engineering and secretarial science.

Appointment of Dr. Francis J. Donohue, professor of education, as acting director of the reorganized and enlarged general evening division was announced by the Very Rev. William J. Millor, S.J., president of the University.

Mr. Donohue is a graduate of Fordham University and the University of Michigan. He majored in school administration and has made special study of the G.I. Bill of Rights and the Rehabilitation Program (Public Laws 346 and 16).

New features of the expanded night school include a six year Ph.D. degree course and a four year engineering course. The Downtown evening division of U. of D's Commerce college which was established in 1916 will continue its special business administration and pre-legal training.

Pre-college counseling is available through the Student Council Bureau during the summer. Registration will be Sept. 20 and 21.

Erosion Menaces Vast Area Of Middle West Farm Lands

CHICAGO—Although more than 75 per cent of America's Grade A farm land is located in the Middle West, an alarming share of this priceless resource is being lost each year by erosion and the steady drain from marketed crops and livestock, according to a statement by the Middle West Soil Improvement Committee. The statement listed as "weapons" in the anti-erosion fight such measures as a permanent soil building program that includes regular crop rotation, the growing of legumes for cover purposes and adequate applications of mixed fertilizer.

Whooping Cough
Until recently there has been no effective way of dealing with whooping cough. Now comes Dr. Harriet H. Felton with the announcement in the Journal of the American Medical Association that when hyperimmune serum is used the mortality rate of the affliction is lowered. The serum is prepared from the blood of an adult donor who has a history of whooping cough in childhood.

Refinishing Kitchen Tables

Old kitchen tables can be made gay by applying stenciled designs—a flower spray at each corner of the top, or a conventionalized border around the edge. This ornamentation is put on after the table has been painted or lacquered a solid color. A coat of good waterproof varnish will enhance durability and make the surface easier to clean.
