**BETTER-SOIL CARE MEANS HIGH YIELD, LOWER OUTPUT COST**  
CHICAGO.—Soil conservation was recommended "Item No. 12" in the farmer's rewar planning, in a statement made public here by the Middle West Soil Improvement Committee.  
"The best preparation a farmer can make to meet the competitive conditions of the postwar period is to build up the fertility level of his soil," the statement points out.  
"It is simple common sense to make ready for the inevitable lowering of farm prices which will come when the present abnormal demand for food slackens. The farmer who looks ahead will have his soil in such shape that high crop yields will cut his production costs to the point where he can withstand a period of lower prices.  
"Thus the purchase and application of mixed fertilizer during the next year or two is one of the soundest investments a farmer can make for the future. Compared to the price of farm products, fertilizer is cheaper today than it has been at any time in the past. In addition to promoting soil conservation, fertilizer pays its own way. Experience has shown that every dollar spent on fertilizer may be expected to return from \$3 to \$5 in increased yields, quality and feeding value.  
"The need for soil conservation has been intensified by wartime crop production schedules. The soil's resources of nitrogen, phosphorus and potash have been used up faster than they have been replaced in order to meet the wartime need for more food. Hence a gigantic soil rebuilding job lies ahead—a job which necessarily must be the responsibility of the individual farmer."

**Chromium Plating**  
The concrete application of chromium plating is due to Dr. Colin Garfield Fink, metallurgist and research engineer, who converted laboratory experiments into commercial practice about 1922. He obtained U. S. Patent 1,581,188 on April 20, 1925. Dr. Fink points out that chromium plating had been attempted prior to 1922 but no one had discovered the reason why the plate could not be reproduced at will. His discovery was "the catalytic agent necessary to carry out chromium plating commercially." The first application of chromium plating to wrist watches was sometime in 1922-23, being one of many numerous applications of the process and not a specific application.  
Narrow Shelves  
Narrow shelves promise to be a feature of the postwar kitchen and storage room for canned goods, because they save the housewife time and also save lumber or other building materials. Research workers in household equipment at the New York Experiment station report that much time may be saved if packaged or bottled food supplies stand only one row deep. This makes it easy for the housewife to see her stock at a glance, and to remove any single item without reaching over or disturbing others. The studies show that in the average home kitchen about 175 frequently used items are kept on cupboard shelves. Most of these need shelf space no wider than 4 1/2 inches, the rest only 6 1/2 inches.  
Eradicate Containers  
Burn empty bags which contained insecticide materials; arsenical containers must be burned in open air, with care to avoid exposure of persons or animals to fumes. Burn unused discarded materials at least a foot below the surface and away from water supply or drainage.
