ANNUAL REPORT
SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 8, NOVI TOWNSHIP

Annual School meeting of District No. 8, Novi Township, was held July 9, 1945, at the school. Minutes of last annual meeting were read and approved as read.

Treasurer's report was read by treasurer, Mr. Gow. Budget report for the ensuing year was read by the secretary, Mr. Robert Davis.

It was moved by Mr. Frank Clark that the two above reports be adopted. This was seconded by Mr. Fred Smith. Motion was carried.

President Mairs asked for a decision as to the length of the school term for the ensuing year. Motion was made by Mr. Robert Hunt, supported by Mr. Rex LaPlant, that we adopt a nine and one-half month school term for the ensuing year. This motion was carried.

Motion was made by Mr. Robert Hunt, supported by Mr. Fred Smith, that the chair appoint two tellers for the election of officers; President Mairs appointed Mr. Rex LaPlant and Mr. Irwin Martin to act as tellers.

Nominations were declared in order to fill the full three-year term of President Mairs. Mr. Mairs was nominated by Robert Hunt, supported by Frank Martin. Mr. Dave O'Leary was nominated by Charles Trickey, supported by Eugene Verdune. Frank Martin moved the nominations be closed. This was supported by Fred Smith. As a result of 303 ballots cast, Mr. Mairs received 61 and was declared elected.

Nominations were declared in order to fill the three-year term of Treasurer Gow. Mr. Gow was nominated to succeed himself by Walter Trickey. This was supported by Mr. Trickey. Mr. Robert Hunt was nominated by Fred Smith, but the nomination was lost for lack of support. Mr. Robert Hunt moved that Mr. Gow be declared elected by acclamation. This was supported by William Flint. This motion was carried.

President Mairs instructed the tellers to cast a unanimous vote and declare Mr. Gow elected.

Mr. O'Leary moved that the School Board use moneys which they may have available in the surplus fund to build a garage for the school bus. This motion was supported by Mr. Trickey. Mr. Hunt offered an amendment to the above motion, authorizing the School Board to increase the tax millage as required to build the above mentioned garage. This was supported by Mr. Fred Smith. A vote was taken on the above amendment, but it failed to carry, while the original motion carried.

A motion to adjourn was made by Frank Clark, and supported by Steve Spizak.

SAVE FERTILIZER
BY LIMING
ACID SOILS

Fertilizer is largely wasted if used on highly acid soils, advises Karl D. Bailey, county agricultural agent.

This is particularly true in connection with alfalfa and clover. The right fertilizer when the legumes are seeded should benefit them and all the crops used in the rotation. But it won't help much if the soil needs lime.

Demonstrations conducted by Michigan State college soil science research specialists have proved this, according to Mr. Bailey. A number of farmers in the state have carried on similar tests in cooperation with the college, and the results have been the same.

As a rule fields that were limed eight or 10 years ago are once more on the acid side and should be worked to permit fertilizer to be used efficiently.

Mr. Bailey stresses that the best way to learn whether soil is acid is to have it tested. Every farmer can find out how to make his own tests by contacting the county agent. Soil testing outfits can be obtained at a very small cost, enabling the farmer to make his own tests at his convenience.

"Much fertilizer could be saved, and crop production increased on many fields in Michigan by testing for acid soils and correcting the acidity before using fertilizer," Mr. Bailey states.

SET NEW ALTITUDE RECORD




