

3 Judicial Vacancies In Wayne County

Three name candidates are seeking to fill the vacancy on the Circuit Court of Wayne County (Third District) created when Thomas E. Brennan was elected to the State Supreme Court two years ago.

Namesake, and himself a high state official, Thomas J. Brennan, 7866 Calhoun, Dearborn, is among the candidates.

Currently a Democratic member of the State Board of Education and a past president of the state board, Thomas J. Brennan plans to give up the education post if elected to the Circuit Court.

Opposing him in the primary race are two almost equally familiar names.

Richard M. Maher, 1699 Ardmore, of TV's Traffic Court fame, is seeking elevation from that bench. So is John D. O'Hair, 2989 Burns, who is currently a common pleas court judge.

The term they seek expires Jan. 1, 1973.

A VACANCY for Wayne County probate judge has drawn six candidates. It was created by the retirement of Probate Judge Joseph A. Murphy.

Seeking to fill the post are: Y. Gladys Barsamian, 14425 Forrester, Philip A. Gillis, 1288 Kensington, Daniel N. King, 2 Clairview Drive, Robert E. Murphy, 9734 Hawthill, Joseph J. Patrick, 19597 Brownsbury, and George T. Ryan, 17214 Pennington.

Patrick holds the highest office currently of the group. He is a Detroit Common Pleas judge.

The term expires Jan. 1, 1971.

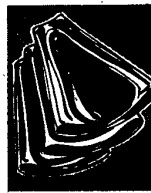
