

Accident Victim Mending

A Detroit man who was seriously injured in a four-vehicle crash on I-96 west of Farmington Tuesday was reported to be "much improved" by a Botsford General Hospital spokesman Thursday.

Meanwhile, the death toll of the crash stood at one with injuries proving fatal to John Henry Graham, 45, of Detroit, who died in Botsford Hospital nine hours after the accident. His passenger, who was said by hospital authorities to be responding favorably to treatment, was Eddie Johnson, 29.

The accident occurred in Novi, just east of Beck Rd., when an eastbound chartered bus collided with a truck during a heavy squall. The bus was loaded with 50 children returning to Detroit after an outing at Kensington Park.

Graham was the driver of a car following the bus, and when he veered across the center strip his vehicle crashed into a state highway department truck.

Ruling Deprives Judge Of Using Title On Ballot

"It's disappointing, but not fatal" was the reaction of Michael J. Hand, municipal judge for the City of Farmington, to a ruling handed down Friday by Oakland County Circuit Court Judge Robert L. Templin prohibiting the use of his title on the ballot.

Hand is one of five candidates for the newly created post of District Judge. The new District Court will serve both the city and township.

Township Trustees Earl Oppert, a candidate for the same post, intervened in a pending suit to argue the case. The original case had been brought by Allan Tushman of Southfield against the Oakland County Election Commission and Southfield Municipal Judge Clarence Reid Jr.

BASIS for the legal arguments were:

The constitutional provision that a judge can be listed as an incumbent only when he holds that specific office and is seeking re-election.

A provision of the bill establishing the district courts provides that incumbent or associate municipal judges could carry the designation of the post when running for District Judge.

Judge Templin ruled that this section of the law was unconstitutional.

IN ADDITION, Oppert, who argued before the court that "it was unjust and misleading to the electorate to grant a

special designation of 'Municipal Judge' to one who had never been elected to the office of Judge, particularly where he had never been elected to public office in an area which comprised about five-sixths of the district."

Hand, who lives in the city, has been elected to a city post. However, he has never faced the voters in the township.

Judge Templin ruled on the case immediately and held that the municipal judge designation could not appear on the ballot.

He then issued an injunction prohibiting the Oakland County Election Commission from printing ballots with the designations.

Pet Show To Be Festival Event

New this year to Farmington Founders Festival events will be a Pet Show to be held at 2 p.m. Friday, July 26, in the Plaza Shopping Center and sponsored by the Plaza Merchants Association.

Entry forms may be obtained at any plaza merchant's and must be submitted to the Pets 'n' Particulars shop prior to 6 p.m. Wednesday, July 24. Age limit for contestants is 14 years or younger.

Pets will be judged in 10 categories—dog, cat, long ears, shaggy, most unusual, best groomed, best trained (one minute to perform), largest, smallest, best dressed pet and owner and oldest (must have proof).

Each pet may be entered in only two categories with a separate entry form filled out for each category. No more than two pets may be entered and must be kept on leash or in proper containers at all times.

Contestants should report to the show registration desk at least one half hour before show time.

Gift certificates redeemable at any member of the Plaza Merchants Association will be awarded to the winners in each category at \$5 for first place, \$3 for second and \$1 for third. The first place winner in each group will compete for a trophy to be awarded to the best pet in the show.

Master of ceremonies will be Ralph Parnin. Pets will be judged by John Washburn III, president of the Farmington Board of Education; Thomas Nolan, township trustee; and Harry Wingter, president of the Farmington Board of Commerce.

Dan's Submarine Shop will present a three-foot long submarine sandwich to the owner of the best pet in show and the two runners-up.

All contestants will receive a certificate of participation.

Four Draw Probation And Fines

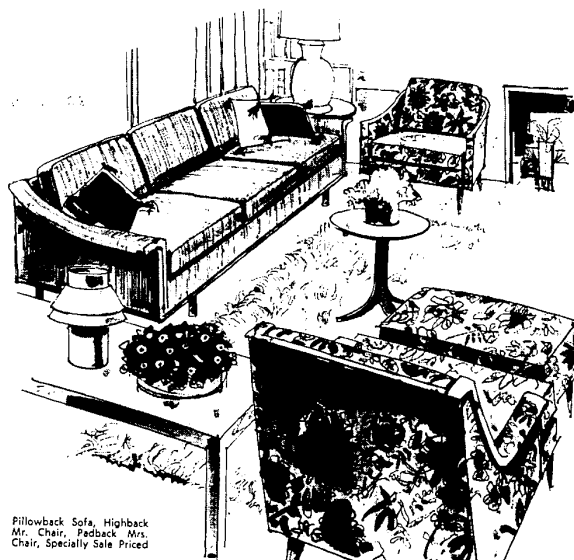
