EXCHANGE CLUB FEATURES TALK ON MODERN HOME

The program at Farmington Exchange Club Wednesday was one of the best ever to be offered, and the speaker, Richard Pollman, was enthusiastically received by members and their guests. Ladies were invited to attend the program portion of the meeting, and several availed themselves of the opportunity to hear the speaker, who is a foremost authority on ranch house construction.

In his talk Mr. Pollman stressed the advisability of building a home which will not soon be outdated. Among some of the new construction ideas he presented were double-glass sealed windows, with a ventilating system which may be inexpensively operated. Heating should be done by radiation, and not convection, and he enlarged upon the heating plan whereby the entire floor surface is uniformly heated, underneath the carpet. He said that under no circumstances would he put a basement in a new home, and the necessity for a basement could easily be eliminated through multiple use of available space.

Following his talk Mr. Pollman answered the many questions of his interested audience. He urged his listeners not to call him by telephone, to discuss their house construction problems. He is now preparing a book which will contain 75 new ideas for house construction.

Next week's program, with E. V. Ayres in charge, will be in the form of a round table. Dr. Trepan of Birmingham, Dale Kenney, superintendent of schools at Rochester, and Gerald Harrison, principal at Northville will discuss "Can Civilian Education Profit from the Military Education Program."

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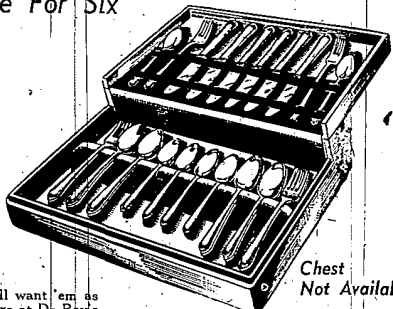
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
