Robert Denbo, son of Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Denbo, 28404 Independence, will leave for the Armed Forces on October 23.

Teo's Glenn D. Kaiser, son of Charles Kaiser, 2365 Haggerty Highway, is now stationed in Garmisch-Partenkirchen, Germany. He is a member of the 1938 Olympic team for occupational duties. Inducted October 25, 1942, at Fort Custer, Michigan, he joined the Tenth Armored Division November 23, 1942. During combat he served as an Air Compressor Operator in the 55th Armored Engineer Battalion of the Tenth. Corporal Kaiser is entitled to wear the Presidential Citation for participating in the battle for Bastogne. He also wears the Good Conduct Ribbon and the European Theater of Operations Ribbon with three battle stars from the Pacific, the Atlantic, and Central Europe Campaigns. He also took part in the daring Saar River crossing near Ayl, Germany, which was on the Siegfried Defenses.

Theodore Polcyn is home on furlough from the army, where he is stationed in Panama. He will return to new orders October 20.

Norsie Polcyn of Waldron Street, arrived home October 11 and is home honorably discharged from the army.

Sept. 14, 1945

Dear Enterprise,  
I never wrote before because of the censorship. I couldn't say what I wanted to say.

I want to thank you for sending me the Enterprise. It has followed me all through the Pacific and brought me news of home. I have been on quite a few islands out here and the Enterprise has never failed to be in the mail-bag.

"I have been on an island in the Marshalls, and from there I went to Tinian. I was on Tinian four months and then went to Saipan. I stayed on Saipan until March 1 and went aboard ship again. We first went to Okinawa, and an April 1st we made false landing on the Southern end while other troops were making a beach head on the western end. The idea was to hold the Japs at the Southern end so that troops on the western end could get in close enough to set up a mine. We then went out to sea to stand by to see if the troops that landed needed help. They didn't, so we went back to Saipan which was getting to be like home. We stayed on Saipan for about a month and then we made false landing on the LSTs. We left Saipan and hit the island of Ikehayama. There had been Japs there but they had gone to Okinawa to help in the battle, leaving a few old civilians. The ones that could work went to Okinawa with them. We stayed there a week, went back aboard LST and hit the island of Aguna Jima. The same thing happened there. The Japs had pulled stakes and left for Okinawa. We were also there a week and boarded ship again and went to Okinawa. The second day we were there we were on the front lines. We stayed there until the battle was over and then came home to Saipan. We were there about two months and now I'm aboard ship again. I don't know for sure where we are going, but there's talk that we are headed for Japan for occupational duty.

"I don't know how long I will be out here yet. I guess I just have to wait my turn in coming home. I would like to thank you again.

Mrs. James Doolittle, guest speaker, told of the wonderful work that has been done in convalescent hospitals. Her talk was highlighted by amusing incidents in her life, and in the life of her famous husband.

The president stated that 357 former areas and was thoroughly discussed. It was determined that the VFW Auxiliary would adopt the off-duty uniform of the W.A.C. which was modeled by Betty Hargrave. The Farmington delegates are most enthusiastic about the new uniform and are sure when any member sees this snappy new uniform they will be anxious to discard their old one. all teaching as a development of what is within rather than just pouring in so many facts. To do this teachers must be a gold mine of resources in directing emotions even more than experts in subject matter. The emotional approach through art, movies, books and radio offer still another avenue to the child's learning citizenship. Mr. Boltz emphasized the value of individual and group guidance based on the needs and interests of the student and of society. There is constant need for the teacher, the student and the administrator to measure and evaluate these methods, attention to be focused on the total value of the child as a human being.

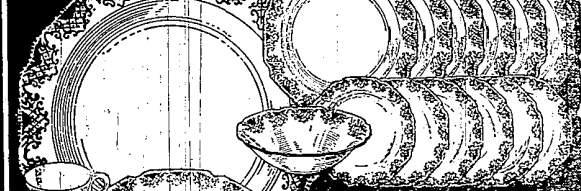
