

**Werewolves Characterized By Vicious Nature**

Werewolves symbolize a traditional manifestation of depraved, carnivorous appetites. Belief in werewolves still exists in some parts of Europe today, and a werewolf is generally thought to be a man or woman transformed into a wolf or some other vicious animal. Frequently the individual actually becomes himself to have been transformed into an animal.

In Scandinavia and England werewolves seem to have been identified with outlaws and with social outcasts who were subject to berial slays. To the Slavs and Bulgars, a man's soul actually enters the wolf for a time. When his soul returns to its human body the victim is exhausted and aches as though he had experienced violent exertion. This form is connected with a popular belief in vampires.

Werewolves seem to have been particularly active in France during the 16th century. Significantly, however, Encyclopaedia Britannica tells of French court cases in 1589 and 1603 in which convicted werewolves were treated as insane and not as metaphysical degenerates.

**Student Duels Highlighted Life at Heidelberg**

Famed in song and story, including chapters by Mark Twain and Longfellow, Heidelberg university before the war had an enrollment of 1,570, nearly a fourth of them women. Eight German universities had larger student bodies than Heidelberg, but none was so cosmopolitan. In past centuries, or had more loyal alumni.

Headlined features of student life at Heidelberg were the student duels. There were fencing bouts among the five rival corps, each with distinctive caps. A facial scar became a badge of honor. The duelling "grounds" were near the Scheffelhaus, at the north end of the old arch bridge in the quaint residential section of Heidelberg. One scene of "The Student Prince" was laid in the beer garden of the Scheffelhaus, most popular with the students was the tunnel and jollicking drinking song from the musical comedy.

To the south the old moated castle of Heidelberg stood out from its mountainous setting, 230 feet above the river. It was an aggregation of fortresses and palaces of past centuries. The castle was largely destroyed in 1693 by the French soldiers of Louis XIV. The castle was noted for the great Twa in the cellar, a cask that could store over 50,000 gallons of wine.

**Shredded Cabbage in Fancy Dress**

A new idea in making Cole Slaw combines both French and Cooked Salad Dressing. Simple directions for making both types of dressing, based on your bottle of salad oil, are given below. Try the combination of the two dressings on potato, mixed vegetable and meat salads, too.

**Cole Slaw.** (4-5 servings) Combine 3 cups shredded cabbage with 1/2 cup grated raw carrot and sprouts with salt. Mix together 1/4 cup Cooked Salad Dressing and 1/4 cup French Dressing with an egg beater. (The resulting consistency is fluffy and creamy.) Add to vegetables, toss lightly and garnish with green pepper rings.

**Cooked Salad Dressing.** (Makes 1 cup) Mix 1 tablespoon sugar, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 2 tablespoons flour and 1/2 teaspoon dry mustard; add 1 egg, add to dry ingredients, mixing well. Add 1/2 cup bottled milk gradually. Then, very slowly, add 1/4 cup vinegar and 2 tablespoons bottled salad oil. Cook over hot water, stirring constantly until thick. Strain and cool.

**French Dressing.** (Makes 1/2 cup) Rub a bowl lightly with cut garlic clove. Remove garlic, add 1/4 teaspoon dry mustard, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon pepper, 1/2 teaspoon onion juice, 1 teaspoon paprika, 1/4 cup bottled salad oil and 1/4 cup vinegar. Stir. Place dressing in a jar, cover and shake until well blended. Chill and shake before using.

**Farmers Should Avoid Risks in Haying**

Since farm accidents statistics show that the haying season is one of the most dangerous times of the year on the farm, farmers should put haying machinery in good condition before the season starts.

It is suggested that farmers check all pulleys, ropes and hitches to be sure they are in safe, workable condition; that all gears and belts are in good repair; and that all parts of the stacker are in sound condition to bear the strain of loads of hay. If ricks are used, the floors should be level and all weak spots repaired. Ladders on ricks should be strong enough to support the weight of a heavy man and should extend one foot above the top cross piece of the rack.

A good practice, too, is to instruct inexperienced workers in the safe handling of pitchforks and to take showers out of gear before working on them.

**Pure Organic Compound**

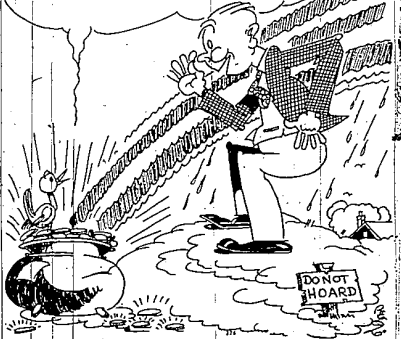
Sugar is the pure organic compound produced in largest quantity in the United States, according to Chemical and Engineering News. Production of sugar is 22 times that of total production of coal in the United States, while 75 times more sugar is produced than isopropyl alcohol. Other pure organic compounds produced in lesser quantities in the United States for use in industry are aniline, phthalic anhydride, formaldehyde, phenol, coal-tar dyes, and glycerol.

**Egg Temperature**

Fresh-laid eggs have a temperature of 108 to 107 degrees. Experiments have shown that fertile eggs will start to germinate if kept at temperatures of 80 to 85 degrees, and that food quality of eggs decreases rapidly unless they are cooled promptly and stored at 65 degrees or less.

**Model \$21 House Gives Mexican Indians Ideas**

If someone offered you \$21 in condition that you go out and buy yourself a house with it, you might not appreciate the humor of the situation. Yet to an Indian family of Ixcatepec, a valley village 60 miles from Mexico City, \$21 actually represents the price not just of a home, but a model home at that.

When the Camaholita Rural Reconstruction center built such a model house, all of the 23 families of Ixcatepec came to gaze at it in amazement. Three rooms of a kitchen with red-tiled roof, it had a adobe with a chimney, a bathroom, built in cupboards, windows and a wooden floor. But not one of those Indian families would afford \$21!

However, points out the Inter-American magazine, the experiment proved that a better way of life was possible. The Indians began to improve their own homes by putting in windows, dividing the customary one large room into two, adding a kitchen and a rudimentary bathroom.

**Floating Drydocks**

Though several different models of floating drydocks are presently in operation, the newest and most radical of these is the advanced base sectional type, in which 10 separate units, or barges, are joined together to form a repair dock that can accommodate a battleship. When this type dock is assembled, the separate barges form a surface nearly as long as three football fields and with side walls rising higher than a five-story building. Each of the sections has a lifting capacity of 10,000 long tons, equivalent to a fleet of 11 average automobiles. An assembly composed of seven such sections joined together is large enough to accept battleships.

**Dry Shampoo Restores Life to Window Shades**

Non-washable window shades can be refreshed and often give another year of usefulness by applying dry shampoo. To cleanse shades by dry shampoo, start by taking them down and dusting them on both sides.

For dry suds, boil one part of Mir or packaged soap with five parts of water and cool until the suds jell. Then whip with an egg beater until a dry lather is formed with no liquid at the bottom of the bowl.

Apply the dry suds with a soft cloth or brush or sponge to a small section of the shade. Rub lightly and then wipe the sides off. Wipe the area again with a cloth wrung almost dry in clear warm water. Rinse until all suds and soil have been removed and wipe with a dry cloth. Continue until the entire surface has been cleaned. Reverse the shade, and clean the other side the same way. Always overlap a little when applying suds to avoid streaking.

**Brazil's Coal Output Stimulated by War**

Brazil's coal production rose from about 500,000 metric tons in 1931 to 307,224 in 1939, then jumped to 2,034,111 in 1944 as wartime shortages of imports stimulated the development of mining at home. Imports dropped from 1,700,000 tons in 1937 to about 600,000 in 1943.

Mineral Brazilian coal, long retarded by transportation difficulties and lower-cost imported coal, has been aided in recent years by government loans and tax exemptions. While few deposits of high-grade coal have been developed, Brazil has extensive bituminous deposits, largely rated as low-grade.

Mineral reserves in the four states of Rio Grande do Sul, Santa Catarina, Parana and Sao Paulo, where the chief deposits are located, are calculated at 5 billion metric tons.

**Sharp Lawn Tools**

When cutting grass, use a sharp mower. A dull mower chews off the grass and wastes it, resulting in a brownish cast to the lawn. Cutting grass often and not too close will minimize the presence of weeds, smother some old lawn out, and prevent weed seeds from germinating. Adjust the mower to cut 1 1/2 to 2 inches from the ground.

The longer top-growth means a more extensive root system to search for food and moisture, and requires less watering. However, close cutting is good for creeping grass, for lawns infested with crabgrass, and old lawns which are being renovated and reseeded.

Clippings benefit the lawn by providing a mulch, and furnishing a portion of the necessary plant food. If the lawn is mowed often, and the grass cut high, the clippings will work down in the grass and not be unsightly. They may need to be removed, however, during periods of wet weather, and if they begin to mat together.

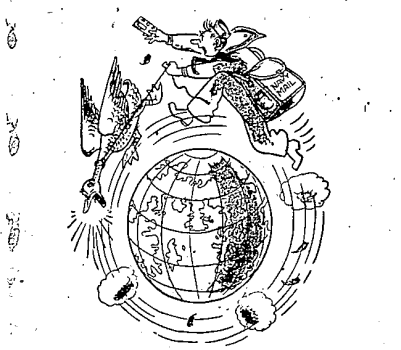

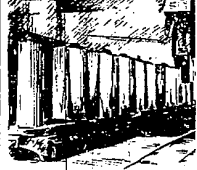

**Embattled Islands**

Originally known as the Lucayos from the aborigines occupying the islands, the Bahamas were held by Spain at the beginning of his history. Having shipped most of the native population for work in other colonies, the Spaniards moved out and the English moved in in 1629. Spain later decided to claim the islands by right of discovery and ousted the English. A period of disorder followed — the English trying to regain their foothold, French forces making an occasional raid, and pirates making themselves at home regardless of the international tug-of-war. In 1718 another English settler took root with the aid of the British crown, and in 1783 the Bahamas became a possession of the British crown through purchase of the rights granted the old lords proprietors. As every schoolboy knows, it was through the Bahamas by his landing on San Salvador (Watling Island) that Columbus first entered the New World.
