(Continued from Page 1) This sum of labor and materials this summer the building operations, begun last June, have been practically completed, largely through the voluntary efforts of the members. The structure has been so planned that the lower classroom can also be utilized for additional space in the fellowship hall and that a third classroom can be added above at any time.

St. Paul's church organized in 1892, constructed its first house of worship in that year. In 1929, during the pastorate of the Rev. K. Lorenz, the congregation purchased and enlarged its church building. Since that time the church has been served for twenty years by the Rev. P. Graunper. Since his retirement last year the Rev. E. L. 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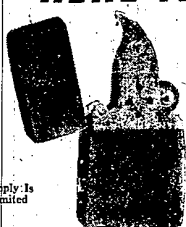
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
