

Remove Mildew
When mildew is found on linens, wash with soap and water and hang to dry in a sunny spot. For stubborn mildewed areas, cover the affected places with lemon juice and salt, then hang in the sun. A more drastic treatment is in order for mildew spots that have a firmer start. Soak white fabrics in a sodium perborate solution of about four tablespoons to each pint of soapy water. (This is the same sodium perborate commonly used as a mouth wash.) Rinse thoroughly and hang in the sunniest and airiest place you can find.

Removes Mildew Stains
Old mildew stains on white cotton and linen materials may be taken out with chlorine bleach or javelle water, but use it only as directed on the container.

Bee States

Vary Breakfasts
You can vary the different parts of breakfast from day to day—the fruit, the kind of bread, the cereal or other main dish, and the beverage. In many families breakfast begins with fruit, but some people like a hot food first in cold weather, and prefer their fruit last. Changing the order of the menu does not matter. Citrus fruit is first choice as a breakfast fruit. An average serving of four ounces or half a glass of orange juice or half a grapefruit goes far toward meeting vitamin C needs for the day.

That historical landmarks, such as these, would enrich Michigan's tourist industry is our observation. Financed preferably by private contributions and administered by the conservation department, they would be a sound business investment.

A major handicap, according to Harry H. Whiteley of Dowagiac, a member of the state conservation commission, is an "extreme lack of funds." The state park budget was cut by the legislature from an anticipated \$3,000,000 to \$1,000,000 during the 1915 session. "With approximately 5,000 acres on its hands, the state department finds itself literally strapped for money. Mr. Whiteley points out, "After more or less marking time during the war period, we must now begin to do something that can be sensed by the public." That will require adequate state funds which, to date, according to Mr. Whiteley, have been "symptoms of legislative lethargy and indifference."

If historical landmarks are to be acquired and preserved, action must be taken first by local governments, by privately-raised funds, or by memorial gifts. Later on these acquisitions could be turned over to the state for maintenance as part of the state's recreational program. Such is the outlook today as we see it.

Wedding Ring
The wedding ring dates back to at least the second century B. C., when it was merged with the betrothal ring. Its origin has been attributed both to the Egyptians and the early Romans. At first it was secular in significance, the Romans using a signet ring to indicate that the husband was endorsing his worldly goods upon his wife and that she had the right to deal all such goods. The church apparently did not recognize the existence of the wedding ring until the second century A. D. and the first record of a ring used in a wedding ceremony is in the fifth century.

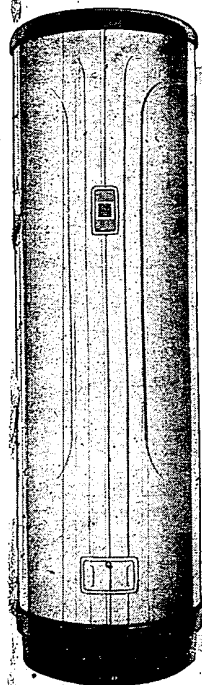

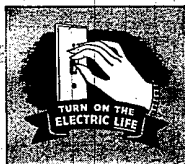

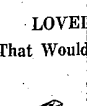
