

## TUBERCULOSIS SEALS ON SALE SHORTLY

The Tuberculosis and Health Society of Wayne County will launch the thirty-ninth annual sale of double barred cross Christmas seals just before Thanksgiving. The sale will continue to Christ- mas with a goal set for \$200,000. William J. Scripps is chairman of the local board which was formed in September to manage all af-

airs of the society. The group will work for the dissemination of scientific and ac- credited information on tubercu- losis and other communicable dis- eases among student and adult groups. Introduced in America in 1907, Christmas seals have made pos- sible a continuing year-round fight against tuberculosis. Great gains have been made. The National Tuberculosis Association and its 2,500 affiliates in the 48 states have conducted a control cam-

paign that has helped in bringing about a seventy-five per cent re- duction in the TB death rate. But the fight is still far from won. The death rate from this disease in the United States is 41.0 per one hundred thousand. In Michigan the rate is 32.5 per one hundred thousand and in Wayne County it is 50.2. New state laws provide that all costs for the care of indigent tu- bercular patients shall be paid from public funds, hence there is little need for any private charity in the hospital care of people sick with this disease.

For this reason the National and Michigan Tuberculosis Associa- tions advised several years ago that money raised in Christmas Seal Sale must be used to develop those factors in tuberculosis con- trol now not so well supplied with funds as hospitals are from the public treasury.

Work of the Tuberculosis and Health Society of Wayne County is the ultimate eradication of the disease through preventive mea- sures, through education, and the use of X-Ray for apparently healthy people. Another import- ant part of the program is rehabi- litation of the tuberculosis patient so that he can be restored to a useful life.

Five per cent of the gross local seal sale will go to the National group to help finance authorized medical research and preparation of scientific information and ma- terials. Ten per cent of the gross will be turned over to the Michi- gan Association, which works in nearly every county of the state. The remaining eighty-five per cent

will be used for program develop- ment in Wayne County. Booth sales in downtown stores, hotel and theatre lobbies, banks and office buildings will open Dec. 15 and continue through Dec. 15. Mrs. Sam Keller, chairman of the women's committee, is in charge of all booth sales. She is assisted by a large and capable steering committee and several hundred volunteer saleswomen. Officers serving on the board of directors are besides Mr. Scripps, James W. Parker, first vice-chairman; Mrs. Edwin F. Holtzman, second vice-chairman and Leo I. LORD BALTIMORE CAKE Measure into mixing bowl: 2 cups cake flour (sifted before measuring) \*1½ cups sugar. ¼ cup Crisco. 1 teaspoon salt. ½ cup milk. Stir vigorously by hand or with mixer (medium speed) 2 minutes. Now stir in (yes, all by itself): 13 teaspoons baking powder. Now add: 4 egg yolks (unbeaten) ½ cup milk 1 teaspoon lemon extract Blend by hand or in mixer (me- dium speed) for 2 minutes. The batter will be smooth and thin. Pour into two 9-inch layer pans (1½" deep) which have been rubbed with Crisco and lined with waxed paper. Bake in moderate oven (375°F.) 25-30 minutes. When cool, frost and decorate as desired, or when cool, put layers together with Lord Baltimore Filling and frost top and sides with Fluffy White Icing. Fluffy White Icing: Heat 1 cup light corn syrup over hot water. Beat 2 egg whites with ¼ teaspoon salt until stiff. Pour hot syrup slowly over egg whites, beating constantly until the right consis- tency to spread. For filling, add ¼ cup chopped maraschino cherries, ¼ cup seeded raisins and ¼ cup chopped nuts to ¼ of the icing. \*Note: To save sugar, use ½ cup syrup and ½ cup sugar. Double-batch or phosphate type (Calumet, Davis, Borden, K. G., Clubber Girl, etc.). With tartrate type (Royal, etc.) use 4 teaspoons.
