**FALCONS WIN
LAST GAME
OF THE SEASON**

In spite of the cold weather last Friday, the Farmington Falcons played one of their hottest games of the year, as they defeated the green and white of Keego Harbor 14-5.

Farmington's first break came in the first period, as they punted from their own 45, to Keego's 5 yard line, where Keego fumbled and P.H.S. recovered. On the third play after the fumble, Quarterback Bob Miller passed to the end zone, to End Elliot Tyler, for Farmington's first score.

Keego got their big chance, as the Falcons received a 15 yard penalty for unnecessary roughness which gave Keego a first down on the 25. However, Keego found it impossible to gain route.

The Falcons struck again early in the second period when Miller, from the 35 passed to Tyler who in turn lateraled to Captain McLean, and McLean darted 30 yards for their second score.

Keego's touchdown came in the third quarter as they took to the air, and on two passes, one from the 50 to 15, and another into the end zone, gave them their six points.

Keego's last two points came in the last two minutes of the game as the Falcons intercepted a pass on the five-yard, and were thrown back of the goal line, giving Keego a safety. Farmington kicked from their twenty and tightened up their defense to hold until the final gun.

This final victory leaves the Falcons with four wins and three losses, leaving them at fourth place in the League. Walled Lake is first in the League with seven games won, and none lost.

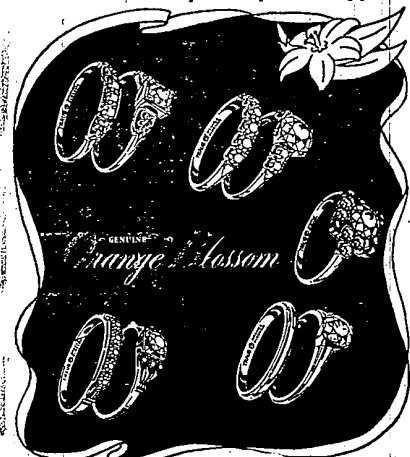
