

Bombing Target

Tree Roots

Heating Efficiency
To get the utmost efficiency out of the fuel that is burned, the flues of steam heating boilers should be externally and internally clean. Just as it would be more difficult to boil water in a teakettle with grease in it, so the presence of grease, oil, or other solids and foreign matter in boiler water makes it more difficult to get up steam. The effect is to increase fuel consumption. The internal cleaning of boiler flues, as well as the entire inside of the boiler, is done by the use of a good boiler cleaning compound.

ORGANIZED RESERVE AREAS ESTABLISHED

Establishment of three military areas to handle Organized Reserve Corps affairs within the Sixth Service Command was announced today by Major General David McClellan, Jr., commanding general of the service command.

Each of the three states in the service command, Illinois, Michigan and Wisconsin, will comprise a military area. Headquarters will be in Chicago, Detroit and Milwaukee, respectively. The deputy chiefs of staff for each state will supervise the military area in that state. Colonel W. H. McCarty is deputy chief of staff for Michigan affairs.

Most immediate problem to be handled by the three areas will be that of personnel administration. Training and mobilization planning are not major factors, as they will depend upon postwar plans for the Organized Reserve Corps. Before the war there were approximately 10,000 reserve officers in the Sixth Service Command. It is expected that the total will be higher upon final demobilization of the army.

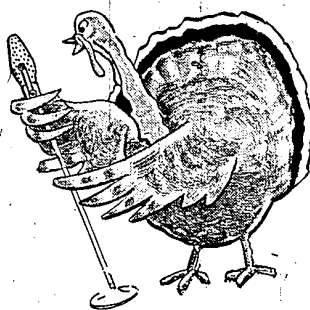
Fasten Shellpaper

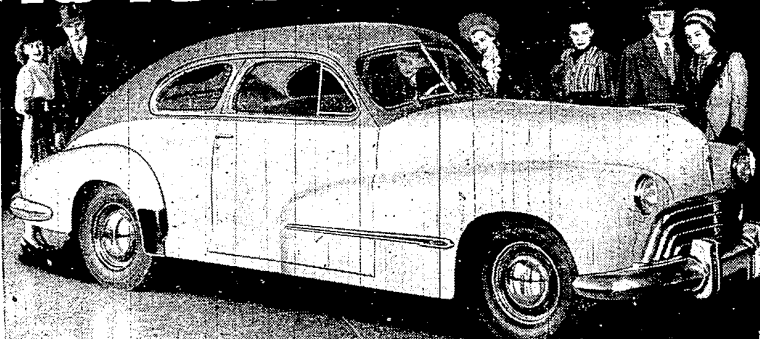

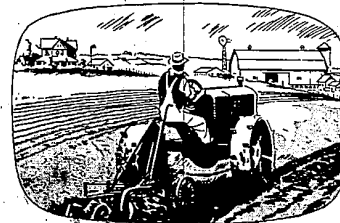
