

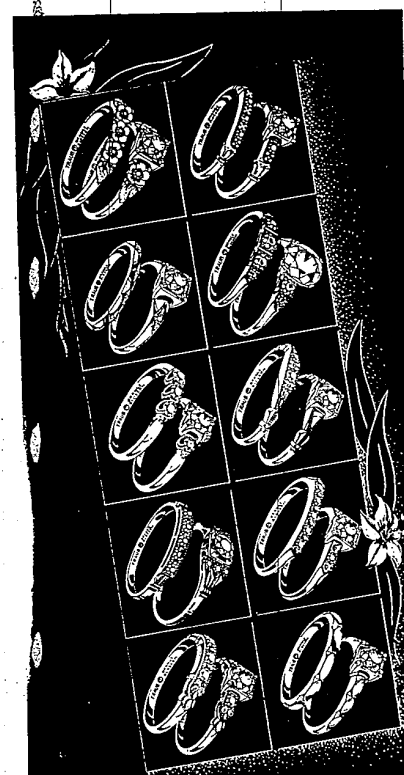

question of *for what it is to be spent.* There cannot possibly be a need more acute than to give our children proper school housing facilities."

Supt. Harry Johnson called attention to the crowded conditions in the adjoining high schools which will cut off pupils from Livonia Township. This is an important factor in producing the critical condition.

Jess Zeigler, supervisor, Livonia Township, stated "1350 building permits were issued in 1945 of which 700 more or less were for new homes. Had building materials been available the number of homes built would have been at least 1500."

George A. Bakewell, secretary, said: "Records show that more than 1700 homes have been constructed in Livonia Township since 1910. Another 1000 homes will be started immediately if building restrictions are lifted. This will mean a corresponding increase in school membership."

The Board is furnishing Honorable John P. Esple, chairman, ways and means committee of the Michigan State Legislature, with a complete analysis of the situation here. He has indicated a willingness to give careful consideration to such a report.

Quick Freezing. The desirability of speed cannot be emphasized in quick-freezing fruits and vegetables. Never prepared them the night before and hold to take to the freezer locker the following day. They should be processed as soon as possible after harvesting. If delay is necessary, the products should be packed in crushed ice or kept in a room of from 22 to 40 degrees Fahrenheit for not more than a few hours.

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
