Farmington voters will be required to act upon two separate questions in the forthcomins school election, based upon the resolution passed by the Board of Education of the Farmington Township School District, at the special meeting held Monday, January 21.

The Board passed a resolution to submit a proposal to the voters to raise five mills for five years, earmarked for building and site fund for a new high school, a majority vote of the taxpsying electors is required to pass this resolution.

The second question involves the exceeding of the 15 mill tax limitation. According to the State Law, if the levying of a building and site tax exceeds the 15 mill tax limitation, it will be necessary for the general electors, by a 2/3 majority, to vote to exceed the 15 mill limitation.

The levying of this tax will cause the tax rate to exceed this limitation, therefore both questions must be vided on.

No date has been set for the special school election as yet.

The next meeting of the Board of Education will be held on Monaday, February 11, at the Parmington High school.
