Shop Boys Develop Sheet-Metal Art

The boys in Mr. Snell's mechanical drawing class are working on sheet-metal drawing which involves: drawing patterns for truncated cylinders, hexagonal prisms and cones; developing 384 piece type elbow; and lastly, laying the patterns on paper to cut them out. If each pattern fits together correctly, it serves as a check on the accuracy of their work. This is the same procedure used in actual sheet-metal work. Geometry, especially solid geometry, is correlated with mechanical drawing.

We're In! The Journalism class interested in the purpose of the "Blue and White" has qualified for a chapter of the Quill and Scroll International Honorary Society. To be eligible a high school must publish a newspaper, such as "The Blue and White," an annual or a magazine which is considered of sufficient merit by the executive council. A charter having been received, individual membership will now be considered.

The Society is a non-profit organization founded April 10, 1926 for the purpose of improving and rewarding the work of high school journalists. Over 3,000 chapters of 40,000 members exist in every state and territory of the United States, in Canada, Mexico, England and New Zealand.

Included with the charter was "A Prayer For A Writer," written by Harry Franklin Harrington, first dean of the Medill School of Journalism. If the staff succeeds in mentioning this in the prayer, that prayer, the goal of the Society will be achieved.

The girls are looking forward to the Girl Scout Roller Skating Party at Keene Harbor on February 16.

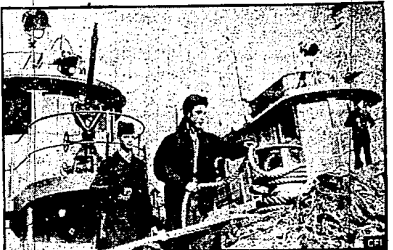
