Boys Smarter—and Dumber! Girls will be found much less frequently than boys in the duller groups and, conversely, not as many girls as boys will be found in the smartest group.

J. A. F. Roberts said in the British Medical Journal. Ten thousand children, he reports, were tested and in the 1,000 that included both the cleverest and the dullest there were 334 boys to 468 girls, or a ratio of 115 boys to 100 girls. The ratio increased as the extremes of intelligence were approached and in the final one-tenth of 1 per cent including the brightest children there were twice as many boys as girls. The Journal of the American Medical Association points out that there is no difference in the mean intelligence between boys and girls, but that it has been observed repeatedly that boys are more variable than girls in intelligence and the difference is undoubtedly due to genetic and not to educational factors.

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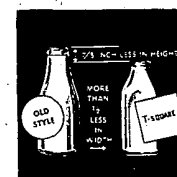
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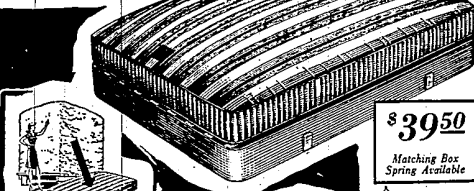
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
