## Farmington SPORTSMEN

Pheasants are by no means an extinct species in southern Michigan. A winter pheasant survey undertaken by conservation department field men eliciting help of sportsmen, is turning up favorable reports in several areas. Typical are:

Eighty-one pheasants counted in Zealand township, Ottawa county, by conservation officer Clayton Perry. And this report from John C. Denver of Sebewaing near the tip of the Thumb—

"Don't remember the winter when I've seen so many pheasants, flocks ranging all the way from 30 to 200 with a good proportion of males. I predict the heaviest pheasant crop we have ever seen here providing we have a good breeding season."

Early returns from the pheasant survey are by no means conclusive as indicated out by G. W. Bradt of the department's game section, but they indicate that there is plenty of seed stock. Good weather during the nesting season next spring should reduce pheasant numbers in territory where the birds are well established. Two favorable breeding seasons may be necessary to bring them back to good numbers in areas where soils are thin.

Domestic trout fishermen are going to have more opportunity to enjoy their sport. The conservation commission has given the green light to a program to create more trout ponds in southern counties.

Anglers' enjoyment of the Portage creek pond in Jackson county's Waterion recreation area has demonstrated that such ponds fill a real need and conservation department fisheries authorities believe that many other small domestic streams can be dammed to provide trout fishing water.

Opened first to trout fishermen under special regulations in 1941, the Portage creek pond was fished by 571 anglers last season. It had previously been closed with brook, brown and rainbow trout and anglers captured 230 trout or 43 per cent of the total original planting. Anglers came from points 20 miles away. Eleven per

cent of trout captured by anglers was returned to the water. The department opened the Wilder creek rearing pond near Marshall and the Bates rearing pond at Hastings to trout fishermen for the first time last season, and will open two additional small ponds on Sylvan creek in Washtenaw county to anglers on April 27.

In his recommendation to the commission, Fred A. Westerman, chief of the fish and fisheries division, declared: "This is one way in which additional fishing waters can be made available and where hatchery reared trout can be used to advantage. There are a number of small spring-fed streams lying south of a line drawn from Grand Rapids to Flint which would lend themselves to this type of development by the construction of dams to impound the water and provide greater depth."

The commission has approved.

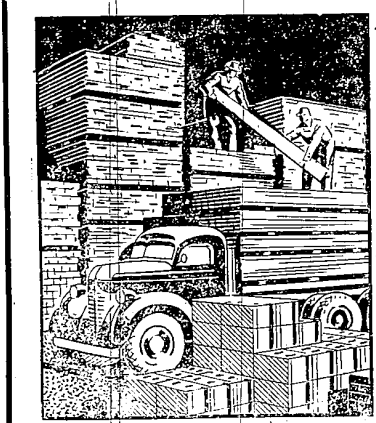

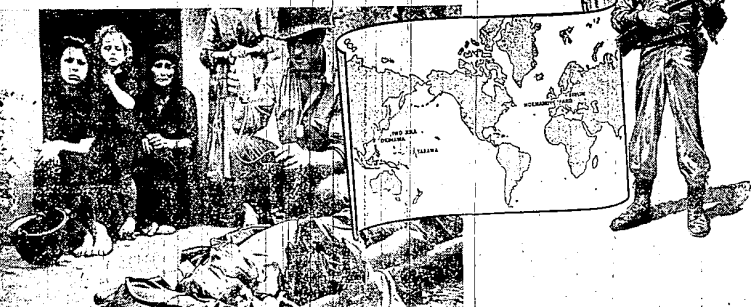
