to the board. Fourthly, Mr. Fisher outlined ways in which the program could be financed, by raising millage, a bond issue and Federal and State aid.

Paul Schreiber, member of the Board of Education, outlined proposed six-point program which has previously been reviewed, in detail, in The Enterprise. This program is designed to meet the immediate needs of the school district, but in no way interfering with the long term planning for a high school. It was presented to the Board in January. The program calls for hiring an architect, proceeding on construction to relieve immediate congestion in Farmington and Noble School areas, immediate investigation to find temporary housing to relieve congestion for the balance of the school year, reconditioning of Nichols School, formation of a fact-finding committee of citizens to assist in the long range planning program and immediate action on increasing millage and bond issue to finance building to relieve present congestion in elementary schools, the high school millage increase and bond issue to come later in the year.

Gerald Domes of the P.T.A. reviewed the program which was presented to the school board by Superintendent Ayres during the early part of the year. Graphs and charts accompanied the report, showing the immediate need for relief in the elementary grades in Farmington and Noble schools. The plan included increased housing in the elementary level, and long term planning for a high school building.

Jess Early, secretary of the Board of Education, told of the Board's ideas, and what action has been taken to date. He explained that planning must conform to the tax income and could be only as extensive as revenue permits. He said the board did not think it wise to select an architect inasmuch as they are unable to build at the present time. The proposed millage increase has been earmarked for a high school, according to Mr. Early, because the board felt this was the first building wanted by the people. He estimated that it would be at least two years before any building could be accomplished. In building a unit for the high school two purposes would be served, first relieving the overcrowded condition in the high school, and also freeing present high school buildings for use in the elementary level. Mr. Early expressed the belief that the school board would develop policies and plans as the district developed.

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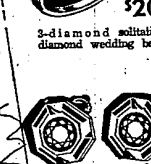
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
