Those persons who attended the School Board Meeting at the High School building Monday evening March 11 were given a revealing insight into the "character" and methods of expression as exhibited by each member of this Board. With heads lowered to avoid the eyes of persons attending the meeting, and in tones barely audible to those who sat next to them, four Members voted to ignore the petitions to retain Supt. Ayres for the coming school year.

With characteristic hang-dog persistency, these same four members of the School Board proceeded to answer the repeated questions of persons in the audience who asked them for reasons for not renewing the contract of Supt. Ayres. It became positively evident by their silence that any excuses that they might present would not stand up under public scrutiny.

Mr. Paul Schreiber is to be commended for the way he stood up and explained to the public just what was going on behind some actions taken by the Board; and also for the motions which he presented at the meeting for action.

The raw deal given Mr. Dunkel when he asked for military leave was called to the attention of the public, and his reference to Mr. Dunkel's letter which is on file with the School Board is an interesting angle to the actions being taken by the School Board. It might be well to publish that letter!

In view of the complete refusal of the School Board to answer, or give at least one logical reason for the action taken against renewing Supt. Ayres' contract; I believe that it is in the public interest that definite steps should be taken by the people of this Community to institute a Petition for a Recall vote. If that does not seem advisable, perhaps a Grand Jury investigation would bring them out into the open.

This experience has been a costly one to the Farmington School system in both money and morale. When election time comes around again we should keep this School Board reminded that after all, the Voter has the Final word.

To the Editor:
Every human who works makes errors. Those who direct workers recognize this element of human frailty.

Teachers are workers and directors. Theirs is a dual capacity, the spirit with which they approach their task is reflected in their work (teaching). The reflection is caught by all whom they teach. If their approach to problems is biased or influenced by threats of intimidation, they are not proper vehicles through which the democratic practices can reach those they teach.

Children thus influenced cannot learn how properly to conduct themselves in a society which declares "life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness" to be the equal right of each citizen. The "better a teacher is equipped to instill this principle in her students, the finer will be the children who are the citizens of tomorrow."

Intimidation is not always given outright expression. It can be applied subtly. In small ways. By even weak characters. Even by inadequate equipment.

Medical science has collaborated with industry to find that errors increase with the worker's fatigue. Further studies have revealed that insecurity becomes a definite source of mental, and even physical, fatigue. Sociologists who are aware of these facts recommend a more personalized relation between worker and director. The greater appreciation of these mutual problems results in a better product.

Teachers are citizens. Their directors should be honest, fair dealing "square shooting" citizens who respect the position of these workers.

We are all responsible to provide adequate tools with which to ask these workers to do their job to the end that the product of their work (children) will be better equipped to face life as informed citizens.

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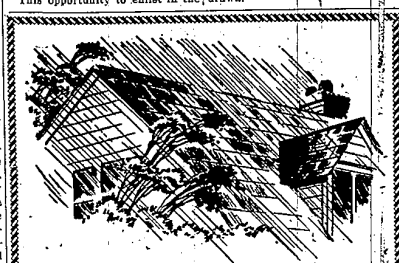
Army Urgently In Need Of Veteran Specialists

"Veterans of World War II, who in the past have not been eligible for enlistment in the regular army in the grade they held at the time of discharge, may now be eligible to enlist in their former grade even though ninety days have elapsed since the time they were discharged."

The Army urgently needs certain specialists who received training and experience during the war.

In order to be eligible, a veteran prior service must have been in one of the military occupational specialties that the Army urgently needs of which there are about four hundred. For example, an airplane maintenance technician would be enlisted as a technical sergeant, provided the total months active service in the military occupational specialty was at least thirty months. If his active service in that particular military occupational specialty was between eighteen and less than thirty months, he would be enlisted in the grade of staff sergeant. One of the other eligibility requirements is that he must have had that military occupational specialty at the time of discharge.

This opportunity to enlist in the regular Army in a grade commensurate with the particular military occupational specialty will be available only for a limited time. As soon as these vacancies have been filled the program will be withdrawn.

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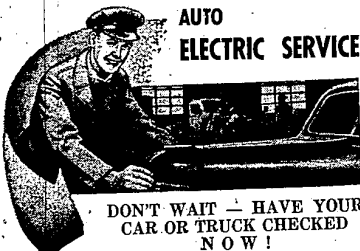
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
