### LIVING COSTS SOAR DESPITE OPA

A member of the Detroit school system, in pointing out the need for an upward revision of school teachers' salaries, has given me some very convincing evidence that the degree of increase in the cost of living is considerably greater than the OPA admits and that the OPA has failed to hold the line in food prices.

Here is the schedule of prices on regular market basket items, compiled from the files of the Detroit News for 1940 and 1946:

The only conclusion that can be reached from a study of these figures is that the OPA has failed to hold prices, and as a result the people are burdened with a greatly increased cost of living. This failure to hold the line has brought on strikes for higher wages, which are being followed in turn by still higher prices that nullify wage increases and leave the worker no better off than before. Obviously the salaries of school teachers, postal employees, and other workers under contract have not kept pace with the increased cost of living or with pay increases in private industries.

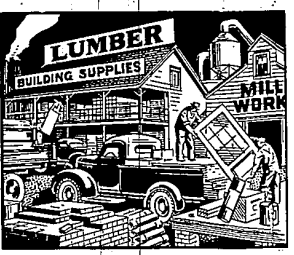
