Roadside Parks To Be Ready Early In May

Anticipating a record flow of tourist travel this summer, indicated by the huge volume of inquiries being received by the Tourist Associations and an 18 per cent increase so far this year in State Ferry traffic above record 1941 the State Highway Department is planning to return to its prowar program as far as roadside parks and table sites are concerned. Tables will be ready for public use early in May, according to Highway Commissioner Charles M. Ziegler.

The Department will use every available roadside table, placing 3,200 at table sites along the trunkline system and an additional 500 in the 50 roadside parks. Roadside parks have toilets, drinking water facilities, stoves, tables and off-highway parking space for cars.

War Department Urges Wacs To Reenlist

Former members of the Wacs who reenlist this month can retain their old grade and have the opportunity of overseas service, the War Department announced today.

The announcement revealed that openings are available in the European Theater for 600 women in five specialist categories — stenographers; clerk typists; clerks, general; telephone switchboard operators; and teletype-writer operators.

The offer applies equally to Wacs who receive the service, who will receive the grade they held at discharge, and to those still in service who volunteer to remain beyond their scheduled time of discharge.

All applications for reenlistment into the service must be filed in the local recruiting stations by midnight April 30, 1946.

Priority for the European assignments will go to those women who have not served overseas because at present there is only a limited need for such duty, the announcement said.

However, in addition to Wac Specialists needed in Europe, there is an urgent need for skilled Wacs in personnel centers, hospitals and headquarters installations in the United States. Hospital, X-ray and laboratory technicians, code and cryptographers and other communications technicians are needed. Former enlisted women who reenlist for these services also will regain their old grade.

Women may reenlist for the duration plus six months, or until September 30, 1946. Wacs still in service may volunteer to reenlist for either one of these periods or may volunteer for duty at their present station for a period of 60 days or more.

Fifteen day furloughs will be given Wacs now on duty who volunteer until September 30 or who volunteer for duty overseas or anywhere in this country for the duration plus six months.
