Air Conditioning
Postwar requirements in air conditioning are said to exceed \$1,000,000.000 in volume. This estimate is based on the small percentages of homes and other buildings now air conditioned, some of which are: less than 1 per cent of restaurants; 2 per cent of doctor's offices; 30 per cent of railroad cars, and similarly small figures for many other establishments.

Load Lines
On every ship there's a painted mark which shows how low in the water she may safely be while carrying a full load. But that load varies depending on where and when the ship is to sail. If she's heading for tropical waters, where the seas are calm, the mark is high. Similarly, she can be loaded more deeply in summer than in winter because less allowance is necessary for storms. There's also a mark for fresh water sailing since buoyancy in salt is less in fresh water than in a ship.

When Will I Get My Refund Check?

"When will I get my refund check?" is a common and natural question being asked these days by many Detroit Edison customers. Since the first of February, refund checks have been going out at the rate of 11,000 a day. However, they are not being mailed according to your name or street address, but are being sent out according to our meter reading schedule. Thus it is entirely possible that some of your friends may already have received their checks, while others who live on the same street, or have the same initial, may not have received theirs.

The only thing you have to do to assure receipt of your refund check is to make sure that the Company has your forwarding address if you have moved since January 1, 1944, or expect to move before June 20, 1946. If you have used service at two or more locations during the refund period, these checks will be mailed at different times. Separate checks are issued for each address. Every effort is being made to assure the earliest possible delivery of all the 1,150,000 refund checks. The last group of checks are scheduled to be mailed June 19 and should be delivered shortly after June 20.

Cash your refund checks promptly. They become void 60 days after date of issue.
