### Workers Over 65 Contact Social Security Office

"Workers in business and industry, 65 or older, should file claims for old-age retirement insurance with the Social Security Board when they have to leave their jobs because of illness," Jack D. Glitz, acting manager of the Pontiac office of the Social Security Board announced today.

Mr. Glitz reports that too many workers of retirement age are failing to apply for insurance payments when sickness occurs. "Some workers intentionally put off claiming their benefits thinking they will go back to work very soon. Others wrongly believe that if they file for their benefits at once, the amount will be permanently fixed, or 'frozen,' from then on."

"If a worker in covered employment becomes ill and is off a month or more he should file a claim to receive benefits," Glitz continued. "If he goes back to work after his illness, the benefits, of course, must stop but they will have served as a form of sickness insurance which he would not otherwise have received. Should his earnings when he returns to work increase his average monthly wage he can refile to have the amount of his monthly benefit refigured."

The acting manager very definitely recommends that workers over 65 in such circumstances contact the Social Security office at 505 Peoples State Building in Pontiac.

Extending Butter  
To extend butter with gelatin, allow one heaping teaspoon gelatin for each pound of butter. Soak gelatin for five minutes in two tablespoons cold milk. Add enough milk to make a pint and dissolve over hot water in a double boiler. Cut butter in small pieces, add to milk and soften. Remove from heat and whip until well blended. Cool and add salt to taste. Pour into a container and chill.

Buster, with one leg amputated and breathing with but half a lung due to ravages of the dread disease, was feted at a gala party given at his home, where he received a pony cart, toys and magazines and was entertained by acts from Ringling Brothers and Barnum and Bailey Circus and a man-to-man baseball talk with Babe Ruth. Party was outgrowth of Buster's appearance on nation-wide radio program in which he told the audience what he wanted most. Doctors say he cannot live much longer.

### RED CROSS NEWS

Mark Smith, chairman of the Water Safety committee of the Oakland County Chapter American Red Cross announces that a Water Safety Course, preparatory to a Water Safety Instructor's Course will begin Monday evening, April 29 at 7 o'clock at Royal Oak High Pool. Individuals 19 years of age who hold Red Cross Senior Life Saving certificates are eligible to attend as well as individuals holding current or expired water safety instructor certificates. Meetings of the class will alternate between the Royal Oak and the Pontiac High School pools. The class will be instructed by chapter water safety instructors. Beginning May 13 at 7 o'clock an instructors course will meet directed by Ernie Goetz, director of First Aid and Water Safety of the Detroit Chapter. Those who satisfactorily complete the preliminary course will be eligible for the instructors course.

Water Safety is designed to provide training in swimming and life saving, to increase understanding of the hazards involved in water sports and of the precautions to be taken. The course is also designed to encourage such aquatic programs and such facilities at bathing places as will keep people out of dangerous situations. The Water Safety committee of the Local Chapter is anxious through classes to ensure a continuous supply of trained aquatic leaders.

Defenses Reveal Caves  
Extension of Gibraltar's underground defense system opened up a cave 50 feet long and 30 feet high, containing stalactites and stalagmites. In a clay-filled fissure about 200 feet behind the eastern face of the rock, and several hundred feet from the top, were found fossils of antlers, jaws, sets of teeth, and vertebrae. Two caves a hundred feet above sea level yielded pottery, stone tools, and other remains indicating occupation of the caves possibly from the Mousterian period to Roman times.
