News and Comments from Congressman George A. Dondero

CLEANING HOUSE IN THE STATE DEPARTMENT. Speaking on the floor of the U.S. House of Representatives, Tuesday, Congressman George A. Dondero, 17th Michigan District, declared:

"I desire to commend the State Department for its efforts to clean house. In the Times-Herald of yesterday appeared information that almost half of 243 well-known employees of the State Department were transferred to the State Department were questionable loyalty cases.

"The other 60 percent were discharged as unsuitable largely because of moral turpitude, poor character references and false statements in their civil service papers.

"These employees were transferred to the State Department from the Office of Strategic Services, Foreign Economic Administration, Office of Inter-American Affairs and Office of War Information.

"In defiance of the intent of Congress to liquidate these Government agencies and dismiss their personnel, the State Department received nearly 1,100 workers from them and only about half have been dismissed.

"It is at least a beginning in the right direction and every loyal American will rejoice to know that one department of the Government is cleaning house."

Recently the Committee on Rules of the House approved for House consideration a resolution by Congressman Dondero directed

VETERAN NEWS

From the OFFICE OF VETERANS' AFFAIRS LANSING

Flight training under the G. I. Bill of Rights, available to World War II veterans, requires an increased use of eligibility benefits. For every \$210 normally used in tuition charges, the veteran uses up one "day" of his number of months of educational entitlement under the act. Tuition charges for flying instruction are several times greater than those for other instruction due to the expensive equipment involved. Nevertheless it is conservatively estimated that several thousand Michigan veterans will avail themselves of this opportunity to learn to fly in one of four programs, private license pilot, commercial pilot instructor, instrument rating course.

The training course the veteran follows, as well as the flying school he attends, must be approved by the Governor upon recommendation of Dr. Eugene B. Elliott, designated by the Governor as the recommending agency. In general the rules and regulations of the Michigan Aeronautics Commission are followed by Dr. Elliott in recommending schools and courses. The operator of the flying school makes his approval application directly to Dr. Elliott.

A veteran submits the usual application for a course of education or training, Veterans Administration Form 1550, to the Veterans' Administration Building, Detroit. He receives a Certificate of Eligibility in return. The veteran and the flight school of the veteran's choice together file the certificate with a new form that has the longest title of any so far: "Application For A Course Of Education Or Training Where The Customary Charges Are In Excess Of The Rate Of \$500 for an Ordinary School Year Under Title I, Public Law 316, 73rd Congress as amended."

The short name for the form is VA 1550-a.

The local veterans' counselor can supply the necessary forms for this program.
