After years of war strain, Americans in 1946 are in a mood for a holiday. We about post-war responsibilities of winning the peace we rush madly into demobilization of our military strength; we hasten to Florida and other resort spots; we spend money lavishly in gambling, entertainment, luxuries.
On top of all this, Washington attempts to compromise reality with the holiday mood of the voters and yet to fulfill our national obligations overseas have resulted only in vacillation and confusion.
It is difficult to believe that Americans, once informed of the emergency abroad, will pursue the path of selfish pleasures; and will disregard the Christmas spirit to be their brother's keeper.
A decision of historic importance is now in the making.
Motorists Asked To Dim Lights When Passing
Because blinding headlights have been a frequent cause for the rising toll of accidents, an appeal for the Auto Club of Michigan for car owners to place more emphasis on dimming their "brights" when approaching oncoming vehicles.
In a letter to C. J. Scavarda, Ernest P. Davis, director of safety for the Auto Club, asked that state troopers pay particular attention to this fault of night drivers.
After cleaning the headlights and checking the wiring system, the Auto Club should provide sufficient illumination for ordinary night travel, Davis said.
"The high beam," he said, "was designed for use in the open country, or in hilly or mountainous districts where sight distances are shorter. But it is on the safe side, and to be fair to the driver of the car coming toward you, the beam should be depressed whenever necessary."
Small Pox Vaccination Advised At Once
"Every person who has not been successfully vaccinated for smallpox in past five years should see his physician immediately for this protection." This warning is issued to Michigan citizens by the state health commissioner, Dr. William McKelvie, following notification from the U. S. Public Health Service that the west coast has an outbreak of smallpox introduced from the Orient.
Dr. McKelvie stated that the west coast outbreak is apparently a more deadly form of the disease than Michigan, has known since the 1924 epidemic of hemorrhagic smallpox.
"Except for a few areas where health officers have carefully emphasized vaccination, Michigan is vulnerable," the Commissioner said. Although there are no records on the percentage of the total population vaccinated, he estimated that it was less than one-third.
Michigan's first case of smallpox since November, 1945, was reported April 3 from Emmett county.

Tropic Paradise
Penang, sometimes called Prince of Wales Island, was the first British possession in the Malay peninsula. It was acquired by the East India company in 1786. It still constitutes one of the few territories actually owned by the British in this area. Most of so-called British Malaya is merely under the protection of Britain, but Penang, Singapore, Province Wellesley, Malacca, and a few widely scattered islands comprise the Straits Settlements, an outright British possession. World travelers have sought out Penang for half a century, regarding it in a class with Tahiti, Martinique and Bali as a tropic life not to be missed. Many round-the-world junketers left their steamers at Penang and took the Malay railroad down the peninsula to Singapore, there to go aboard again. The island is especially beautiful in the northern part, where a range of mountains 2,500 feet high rises from the sea. A ridge of hills cuts through the central area. The rest of Penang's 110 square miles is fairly level, and largely forested.
