Deadman feels it is reasonable to expect suburban residents to pay admission for the art insitute or zoo and says he personally would support Gribbs' amendment. Another approach, Dead-man added, would be to establish a metropolitan authority which would control the zoo and other insituuions residents.

If the metropolitan authority were given complete control over the zoo, Deadman says, then it would be sensible for communities in the greater Detroit area to make financial contributions to the authority.

"The Detroit Zoo should be on an authority basis just as the Huron-Clinton Metropolitan Park Authority where all benefiting com-munities contribute funds.
