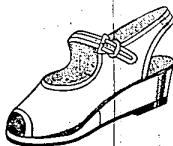

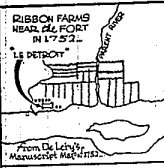

Buy A Poppy To Help A Buddy For years, Poppy Day has always been a great day for all veterans. This year it comes on May 23 and 24. Remember you are helping those we all love, so "Buy A Poppy."

After a careful study of today's real estate market, the Veterans Administration urges the veteran who can do so to wait a while before buying a home. The market today is abnormal. V.A. officials say, and the unsuspecting veteran runs the risk of being "kipped" unless he is cautious. When Congress finally completes action on the housing legislation now pending, production of homes should increase materially. With in a reasonable time, prospective buyers should have a wider selection from which to choose, and prices should be stabilized to the point where the buyer takes less risk of a loss in resale. In addition, the buyer who can postpone buying a home for a year, or perhaps two years, will get the benefit of better materials and sounder construction.

The veteran should remember that he has ten years from the date of discharge in which to take advantage of the loan guaranty provisions of the G.I. Bill. It will be to his advantage to wait if he can.

No Physical Required To Reinstatement Insurance Gen. Omar Bradley, administrator

tor of Veterans Affairs, has just announced that under a new V.A. ruling a statement from the veteran that he is in as good health as at the time of the policy's lapse, replaces the physical examination formerly required. This regulation will remain in effect only through this year. After December 31, 1946, an examination will be required again.

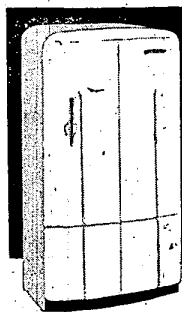
