POLLS SHOW U.S. READY TO SACRIFICE
 It is interesting to note that the American people are perfectly willing to make sacrifices to send food to Europe. Two surveys were made by the University of Denver National Research center, one of which showed that 68 per cent of those interviewed indicated their wish to resume rationing if necessary in order to send critical food abroad.

Another survey by the same institution showed that more than a third of the people (35 per cent) believed that we should send food to Germany as a gift if she could not pay us for it.

I believe that if a similar poll were taken in regard to feeding Japan, the results would be approximately the same.

GARDENS GROW ON SKYSCRAPERS

People have their roots in the soil even when they live 20 stories above asphalt pavements. I had that brought forcibly to mind as I leaned over the wall of a wide terrace of a penthouse garden high above Park Avenue, New York.

As I looked to the right and the left, everywhere I saw fresh green edging other walls like the one against which I was leaning; and below me, I could glimpse neat gardens already sprouting cheerfully in the first warm spring sun. DIPHTHERIA CASES NOTED IN OAKLAND COUNTY

Diphtheria rose to 8th place among the leading causes of death for children between the ages of one and five in Michigan in 1940. Of the 1946 diphtheria cases 9 were from Oakland county.

"This fact should remind parents that the simple, sure protection of diphtheria toxoid should be given to every child before his first birthday," says Dr. William DeKleene, state commissioner of health.

"Diphtheria increased in Michigan during the war and immigration is the only way to stop its continued rise."

During May, health departments and physicians are stressing the importance of protecting children against preventable diseases. Injections of diphtheria toxoid are recommended for the child at 9 to 10 months and again at school age.

Between January 1 and May 1 a total of 187 diphtheria cases was reported to the Michigan Department of Health. This is more than twice the number of cases for the same period of 1942, the year when diphtheria began to rise.

OAKLAND COUNTY HIGHWAY PROJECTS GET UNDERWAY

Plans have been started for raising grade of US-16 from Oakland County line one mile east, including bridge over Keat river, to allow for Huron-Clinton Parkway Authority plan to dam river and create lake. Plans have also been started for widening M-58 between Orchard Lake and Elizabeth Lake roads by reducing boulevard section.

A thorough study of the street and highway needs of Michigan cities, counties and the state trunkline system were under way today under the sponsorship of the Michigan Good Roads Federation, an organization composed of representatives of a score of organizations interested in promoting better roads and streets for this state.

Directors of the federation meeting at Atlas Valley Country Club near Grand Blanc Thursday afternoon approved a suggestion of Highway Commissioner Charles M. Ziegler that city, county and state Highway Departments should sit down together and take an inventory of what all three branches of state government need in the way of street and highway improvements, what can be accomplished under present revenues and what will be necessary if public demands on roads and streets are to be met.

The Commissioner said he believed cities, counties, and

state can agree on what each group should have and will receive public support if they are united on a program for all three units.

The directors authorized Don Smith, Grosse Ile, president of the federation to appoint a five man committee to make the study and report to the organization so that proper action can be taken. Smith said he would ask the Municipal League, County Road Association and State Highway Department to name their own representative on the committee.

The Directors will meet in June Bayport as guests of William Wallace and later in the summer at the Midland Country Club.

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
