HONOR THE DEAD—HELP THE LIVING



Here are three of the many disabled ex-servicemen in two Michigan Veterans' Hospitals who, during the past year, made the two million Memorial Poppies that will be sold by The American Legion and Auxiliary just prior to Memorial Day. Proceeds will be used to aid the needy and disabled of both World Wars, their families, and the families of the dead. Thursday, May 23 and Friday, May 24 will be Poppy Days in Farmington.

Meeting at Detroit, May 1, the Michigan Veterans' \$500,000,000 Trust Fund Board of Trustees set up county committees in several of the larger counties of the state to administer the fund on a county level. The money will be used to give emergency aid to needy World War II veterans and their families.

County committees organized May 1 represent four veterans' organizations. Their names, listed below, are in the following order: American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Disabled American Veterans and American Veterans of World War II.

Oakland: Fletcher, L. Renton and Wm. J. Beer, Royal Oak, and Gordon F. Forell, Orrin Hunsdon of Pontiac.

If the state sales tax had been reduced, Michigan would have lost \$101,000,000 in revenue during the past three years, according to Governor Harry F. Kelly.

In a talk at Saginaw the governor said local governments had received 463 million dollars. "In lieu of the 16 million dollars in sales taxes that was demanded in 1945, there will be returned to the cities before this year has closed a total of 16.5 millions (from intangible taxes) which is 2.5 million dollars more than was asked."

Governor Kelly is proud of the 50 million dollar veteran trust fund created during his two-term administration. "Origin of the 1947 state legislature: Demand for a veterans' cash bonus."

The trust fund will be administered by county committees of veterans. Each county will have four members each, representing the American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Disabled American Veterans and the American Veterans of World War II.

Committee will serve without pay.

Annual income, available for emergency needs of veterans, is now \$1,100,000.

VETERANS' SURPLUS PROPERTY BILL

Priority for veterans in the purchase of surplus property is provided for by H.R. 6157 which the Senate passed on April 19 and sent to the White House for the President's signature. Quick concurrence is predicted.

This measure gives veterans preference to purchase surplus property second only to the federal government. It authorizes the surplus property administrator to set aside available quantities and types of any surplus property except real property, which he determines to be appropriate for the exclusive disposal to veterans for their own personal use and to establish and maintain their own small business, professional, or agricultural enterprises.

The bill also amends the present surplus property law insofar as it authorizes the sale of items for personal use by veterans.

Quantities and types of veterans' preference stockpiles, length of preference sales, and types and quantities of items available for personal use are left to the discretion of the War Assets Administration.

There is the reason why the veteran—although he will be benefited by provisions of the measure—should not expect too much.

In the first place, the War Assets Administration, by admission of Lt. Gen. Edmund B. Gregory, WAA's chairman, has one salient interest: the rapid disposal of surplus stockpiles.

Extension of Gibraltar's underground defense system opened up a cave 80 feet long and 30 feet high, containing stanchions and stags, rifles, in a clay-filled fissure about 200 feet behind the eastern face of the rock, and several hundred feet from the top, were found fossils of spiders, lizards, sets of teeth, and vertebrae.
