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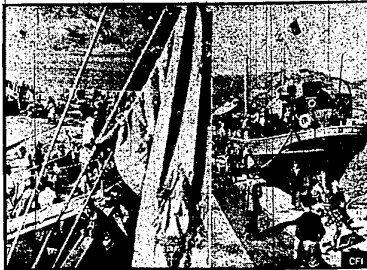
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## ON TO PALESTINE

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## When Will I Get My Refund Check?

"When will I get my refund check?" is a common and natural question being asked these days by many Detroit Edison customers. Since the first of February, refund checks have been going out at the rate of 11,000 a day. However, they are not being mailed according to your name or street address, but are being sent out according to our meter reading schedule. Thus it is entirely possible that some of your friends may already have received their checks, while others who live on the same street, or have the same initial, may not have received theirs.

The only thing you have to do to assure receipt of your refund check is to make sure that the Company has your forwarding address if you have moved since January 1, 1944, or expect to move before June 20, 1946. If you have used service at two or more locations during the refund period, these checks will be mailed at different times. Separate checks are issued for each address. Every effort is being made to assure the earliest possible delivery of all the 1,150,000 refund checks. The last group of checks are scheduled to be mailed June 19 and should be delivered shortly after June 20.

Cash your refund checks promptly. They become void 60 days after date of issue.

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
