(Continued from Page Two) voters wouldn't like it. So don't worry about price ceilings. After all, living costs soared with a natural accident Thursday evening when he fell upon a moving machine and almost severed two fingers of his left hand.

Counting this selfish attitude of the vote-hungry politician is the waste in this country by careless, homeholders and restaurant owners. Americans have always been extravagant with their food; during the World War they consumed more food per capita than before the war—believe it or not, Washington has distributed for months, avoiding a show-down on the food issue and hesitating to impose restrictions, is probably answered by the fact that 1946 is an election year. Politicians don't want to do anything that might be unpopular with well-organized pressure groups back home.

So don't continue the draft of young men after May 15. It might be unpopular with their parents. So don't ration meat or food. The fact that American public opinion has always been ahead of the official. Public opinion surveys demonstrated this, time and again, throughout World War II. It is in Congress, plus the bureaucratic Washington, which lags behind the wisdom of the home front to get things done, Congress is conservative.

The shameful delay in sending food overseas certainly cannot be ascribed to the lack of knowledge about the coming famine. The failure to meet the issues of famine food exports, sufficient military strength for our army and navy and protection of the public against racketeering labor leaders—just to mention a few—should be put on the door-step of Washington, and no place else. The public is ready for action as public opinion surveys have repeatedly proved. Isn't it about high time that Washington took the leadership and did something about it? We think so.

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No Additional House Heating Equipment Can Be Connected Until After Next Winter from the Southwest may be stored in warmer months to help meet the peak demands of winter. Though definite progress is being made, this large undertaking cannot be completed in time to be of benefit during the next heating season. This conversion of Michigan fields into storage areas requires the construction of a 150 mi pipeline and a large gas pumping station, and the drilling of many additional wells in the fields, before they may be made useful for this purpose. The materials necessary to commence this work were expected to be available this Spring, but now it appears that they cannot be obtained before next fall. This announcement is made with great regret, but under existing conditions there is no alternative. Since war-time restrictions were lifted, the use of natural gas has been growing very rapidly. Total use of natural gas for all purposes in the Consumers Power Company service area has practically doubled since 1942. Gas for heating is being requested not only for almost every new home, but also for a large number of homes which formerly used other fuels. The Michigan natural gas fields, which supply a large part of the gas distributed by Consumers Power Company, are being exhausted rapidly and, due to the shortage of materials necessary to enlarge pipeline capacity, the supply of gas from Texas and Kansas cannot now be further increased to relieve the situation. The Company is doing everything it can to improve the situation as soon as possible. It is proceeding with plans to convert two Michigan natural gas fields into storage areas, where gas from the Southwest may be stored in warmer months to help meet the peak demands of winter. Though definite progress is being made, this large undertaking cannot be completed in time to be of benefit during the next heating season. This conversion of Michigan fields into storage areas requires the construction of a 150 mi pipeline and a large gas pumping station, and the drilling of many additional wells in the fields, before they may be made useful for this purpose. The materials necessary to commence this work were expected to be available this Spring, but now it appears that they cannot be obtained before next fall. This limitation applies only to new installations. Customers who already are using gas for house-heating or other space-heating purposes will be supplied as usual. We assure our customers, present and prospective, that every effort is being made to increase the available supply of natural gas and that this limitation will be lifted as soon as possible - but it won't be for at least a year.
