**VETERAN NEWS**

**From the OFFICE OF VETERANS' AFFAIRS LANSING**

Just one year ago this week the first World War II veteran was hospitalized by the Office of Veterans' Affairs under its Emergency Hospitalization plan which operates in connection with local veteran counseling centers.

Since that time 1,008 veterans have received this service. Those veterans were not eligible for federal hospitalization, or such an entitlement had not been established, or the Veterans Administration Facility had not beds for them. This represents a total cost of \$77,702.84 actually paid or in the process of being paid.

Ninety Oakland County veterans received this state assistance through the Office of Veterans' Affairs, which office was created by the legislature. One of the responsibilities of the Office of Veterans' Affairs under the act is to "provide such services as not otherwise offered by federal agencies."

The cost for hospitalization, prosthetic devices, blood plasma, medical expense nurses, ambulance service and x-rays for these veterans from Oakland County already paid is \$532,711 and the estimated cost of cases in process is \$500,000 more. These amounts represent a considerable tax saving to the county as well as an insured and much needed service to the veterans.

Four hundred and fifty-two additional hospital cases are being processed, involving an estimated \$67,800. In addition to hospital admissions, as shown above, 141 cases were processed and charged to other local, state and federal agencies for assistance, or were rejected by the Office of Veterans' Affairs as not being eligible for emergency care under its program.

**FARMINGTON SPORTSMEN**

One of the largest outdoor gatherings of men ever held in Oakland County is scheduled for 7:30 o'clock next Wednesday night, May 23, in Bunyan Bowl of the Oakland County Sportsmen's Club at Waterford. Conservation Department's "sportsmen's guide" program will make a broadcast of the OCSO rally with the revolutionary new wire recorder with which Mort Neff of Birmingham is creating programs for those who love the outdoors, which are broadcast over 21 Michigan stations.

Neff will demonstrate the portable machine with which he captures natural wildlife sounds, forest fires and other outdoor features of the "sportsmen's guide" radio program. The OCSO meeting will mark the first time a broadcast has been made of a sportsmen's roundup.

The "Ford Rambler", a quaint of comic instrumentalists, will be an entertainment feature of the rally, followed by an outdoor movie. George Crater of Royal Oak, will show big game and tribal animal care films from Africa, India and the Orient.

Michigan hunters killed a million pheasants last fall, and the season's yield was "poor" only in comparison with the exceptionally good seasons of 1941-44, H. D. Ruhl, chief of the conservation department's game division, reports.

The one million estimate is based on kill report cards from a 10 per cent sample of the 500,000 who hunted pheasants and computed in the same way as in previous years. The figures have been checked carefully by statisticians and cannot be materially improved unless many more hunters send in their report cards, Ruhl says.

Though 25 per cent under the peak of 1944, the 1945 total approximates equals the kill in 1940 and the late '30's and is higher than many hunters expected. "Boom pheasant years of the early '40's had so accustomed hunters to lots of birds and easy hunting that they viewed a decrease to conditions like those of the 1930's as a near catastrophe," Ruhl declared.

Because of cold wet weather at hatching time last spring, pheasant abundance last fall was reported decreased by as much as 60 per cent in some counties. Department officials believe, however, that ample breeding stock was left in the fields to bring the pheasant population back to normal in one or two satisfactory breeding seasons. Pheasant hunting and rearing in June and July will be observed closely, so hunting rules this fall may be fitted to pheasant numbers at that time.

Reopening of the bathing beach concession at Port Huron Lake in Waterford state recreation area, after four wartime years without use, is scheduled for June 7, the conservation department's parks and recreation division reports. The concession will be operated this season by C. H. Ross of Jackson.

The concessionaire is planning supply bathing suits and towels in addition to the usual line of hamburgers, hot dogs and soft drinks. He is confident patronage of the area will increase greatly as it becomes better known, says Ross. In the region now drive farther to less attractive facilities. Parking space at the beach will accommodate 150 cars and the picnic grounds there will serve 300 persons.
