Let us resolve to do our duty as loyal citizens of a free democracy.

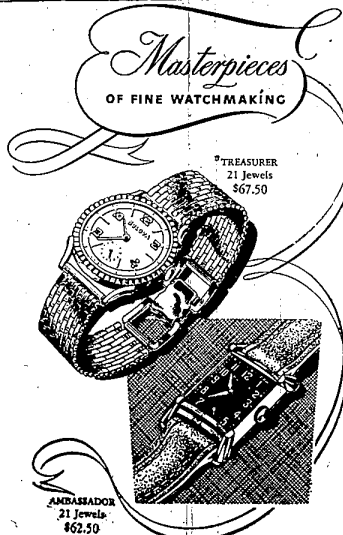

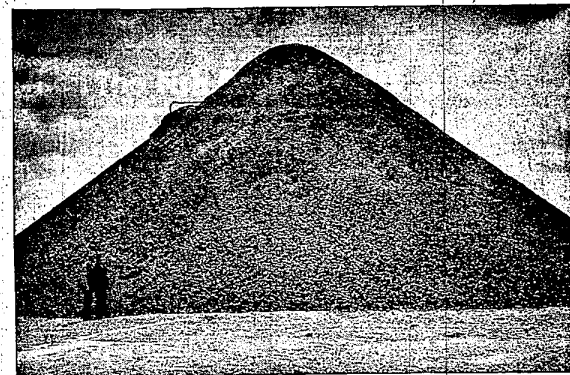
