SIGLER ANSWERS CHARGES IN FARMINGTON TALK

Kim Sigler, Republican candidate for governor, in a short talk at the Town Hall Tuesday morning, at 9:30 answered charges made against him in connection with alleged excessive spending while serving as special prosecutor of the State Graft Grand Jury.

Sigler pointed out that he had spent no funds that were not authorized by the court. He added that charges made against him in regards to the alleged bribing of Charles Hemmas were entirely false.

Referring to Senator Ivan Johnston and his senate investigating committee, Sigler emphasized that "these men do not want me to be elected governor because they know what I will do." He criticized Vernon Brown, present Lt. Governor, and Republican candidate for governor, for his complicity while graft and corruption goes on all around him.

Sigler's Farmington talk was his first appearance in a tour that took the candidate to numerous cities throughout Oakland County Tuesday.
